

Apollo Club Hosts Catholic Chaplain

The Apollo Club Thursday night will host Dr. John D. Fricelle, present chaplain to Catholic students attending A&M.

Fricelle will speak on moral values at the meeting to be held at 5:45 in the rear of the Memorial Student Center cafeteria.

The speaker received his B.A. and M.A. from National University of Ireland and Ph.D. from

the University of Santo Tomas, Manila.

He studied philosophy, sacred scripture and theology at Calgary, Ireland, French at Beaulieu, Belgium, and literature at Toulouse University, France.

Before coming to A&M, Fricelle taught in the Philippines and Ireland, and did Pastoral work in Waco.

Next week the guest of the Apollo Club will be Dr. John L. Gammel. Gammel is presently a professor of physics at A&M, but at one time was the visiting scientist of the AEC in Harwell, England. He received his Ph.D. from Cornell in 1950 and has since been made a Fulbright Fellow.

Gammel has served on the staff at Los Alamos and is the author of some 40 professional articles.

On March 11, Dr. Leslie E. Moser will be the guest speaker. A graduate of Stephen F. Austin Teachers College and Ph.D. from the University of Colorado, Moser will speak on his field of Psychology.

Grads, Faculty Attend APS Science Meet

Twenty-nine members of the graduate faculty, advanced students, fellows and visiting scientists will represent A&M at the annual southwest meeting of the American Physical Society, Thursday through Saturday at Norman, Okla.

They will be among the 600 persons from universities and colleges in the southwest who will spend three days discussing original contributions in nuclear physics, properties of matter, and basic science.

Dr. John A. McIntyre, professor of physics associated with the Cyclotron Institute here will present a 30-minute invited paper on nuclear physics.

Dr. C. F. Squire, associate dean of the College of Arts and Sciences will chair a session of invited papers on superconductivity and helium II.

Twenty contributed papers will be presented by A&M students and graduate faculty members. Altogether, 119 contributed papers and 29 invited papers will be presented.

The meeting will be held on the University of Oklahoma campus.
