clude volunteer and paid fire chiefs from larger Texas cities and highly qualified technical people from manfacturing and industry. More than \$280,000 in equipment and supplies is being provided by manfactures, distributors, industries, federal and state agencies, and many Texas cities.

"All classes will be practical in nature," Smith said "Firemen will learn by doing. They will fight all types of fires which may be encountered within their cities."

"Nearly every fire marshal or assistant fire marshal in Texas will be at A&M to learn new accepted techniques in fire prevention, building inspection and fire investigation," Smith said.
