

had been my biggest thrill in baseball, either as a player or manager, I told myself that was the toughest problem I had had so far this year.

But the more I thought about it, the more simple it was to figure out.

The most thrilling thing that has happened to me in relation to baseball was a simple statement by a doctor saying that I could return to baseball.

On April 1 last year I had a heart attack at which time I was told that I could not actively participate in baseball for an entire year. Then on last July 1 I went for an examination.

I didn't expect the doctor to say what he was going to say but it wouldn't be truthful to say I hadn't hoped, prayed, thought about and wondered what this man was going to say to me. Then I walked in, he examined me and I can almost recall his very words as he spoke.

He said:

"If you will observe certain rules of conduct I don't see any reason why you can't return to baseball."

There it was. The doctor had given me a clean bill of health telling me that any heart attack I would have in the future would have nothing to do with the one I had. And I could go back to baseball, even though the year still wasn't up.

Games. Pennants. Seasons. They didn't compare. The doctor, with that one sentence, had given me in one moment all the excitement you can wrap in my entire baseball career.
