President's Day Busy Before Hospital Trip

WASHINGTON — President Johnson packed with ceremonies and speeches today a day that will end in a hospital bed, just one month after he first felt the pain of a defective gall bladder.

Friday morning, surgeons will remove the faulty organ at Bethesda Naval Hospital.

But today, Johnson seemed determined to show that his ailment is not slowing his presidential pace.

Three ceremonial signings and two speeches were on the schedule before Johnson leaves the White House for the 17-story hospital in suburban Maryland.

He will be there 10 to 14 days. His schedule included:

—The signing of a bill to provide federal grants for water and sanitation facilities in rural communities, complete with a speech before congressmen and federal officials, in what has become an almost daily routine.

—Designation of White Cane Safety Day.

—Proclamation of a Day of Prayer. "This is an annual thing, incidentally," said assistant White House press secretary Joseph Laitin, "that there's nothing particularly significant about."

Verdict Expected In Extradition Case

AUSTIN — Texas officials are expected to give their answer today or Friday to Maryland's request that Mrs. Madalyn Murray be returned to face charges of assaulting a policeman.

Mrs. Murray, 46, who helped bring the suit that resulted in a Supreme Court ruling against compulsory public school prayers, asked asylum in Texas Wednesday in a hearing before Secretary of State Crawford Martin. "I am mortally in fear of my life," she said.

Mrs. Murray was arrested Sept. 25 in San Antonio after being deported from Mexico.

In Baltimore, Dr. Irving R. Murray, chairman of the Maryland Civil Liberties Union, said Mrs. Murray's life is in no danger and she should not fight extradition. He is no kin to Mrs. Murray.

Maryland has asked that Mrs. Murray be extradited to face misdemeanor charges of assaulting a police officer, and disorderly conduct, plus a year's sentence for civil contempt of court.

Mrs. Murray was one of those sponsoring a legal test which resulted in the U. S. Supreme Court ban on compulsory prayer in public schools.

Meanwhile, in Valle De Bravo, Mexico Richard O'Hara, engaged to marry Mrs. Murray, said he will leave Thursday for San Antonio to help her fight extradition to Maryland.

O'Hara said he still plans to wed her.

8 Negro Students Arrested In Huntsville

bearing the emblem of HA-YOU, a local Negro youth civil rights organization.

To date, 29 students have been expelled for the related incidents.

Air Force Postpones Titan 3C Launch

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. — The Air Force on Wednesday postponed the second test launching of the powerful Titan 3C military space rocket until Thursday, Oct. 14. The firing has been scheduled for Friday.

Officials said the delay was caused by a "contamination problem in a transtage pressurization system valve being assembled at the Martin Co. plant in Denver."

Meanwhile, astronauts Walter M. Schirra Jr. and Thomas P. Stafford planned to run through a full dress rehearsal Thursday for their rendezvous and docking Gemini 6 flight scheduled for Oct. 25.

Kidnaper Traced To Wichita Falls

WICHITA FALLS — Peace officers traced an exconvict who kidnaped five people in two states to Wichita Falls Wednesday night.

They said a motorist identified the fugitive, Delbert Garmon Jr. 26, as the hitchhiker he picked up en route here.

All available policemen, sheriff's deputies and state patrolmen were summoned to join in a citywide manhunt. Police advised residents to lock their doors and admit no strangers.

Smith also will participate in the annual conference of the International Association of Fire Chiefs while in Miami. He will review the program of the Florida State Fire School at Ocala Oct. 23.

The chief will discuss fire safety training with sub-committees during the annual meeting of Liquefied Petroleum Gas Dealers Association Oct. 13-15 in Dallas.

Smith will discuss A&M's firemen's training programs at association meetings in Del Rio, San Diego and McAllen next week Oct. 8-12. In addition, he will meet with the city council of Laguna Vista, near Port Isabel, to help organize a firemen's training program.

Foreign Students Enrollment Shows Big Fall Gain

Foreign student enrollment at Texas A&M soared to an all-time high of 542 during the 1965 fall semester, R. L. Melcher, foreign student advisor, announced.

The enrollment reflects an increase of 109 students or 25 percent over 433 last fall, the previous high enrollment.

India has the largest representation with 80 students. Mexico has 55, Pakistan 53, China 52, Tunisia 32, and United Arab Republic 21. Sixteen nations list 10 or more students.

Students from 51 foreign countries are registered this fall.

Melcher's report shows 294 of the students working toward graduate degrees.

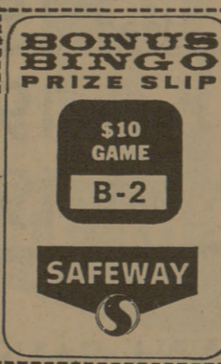

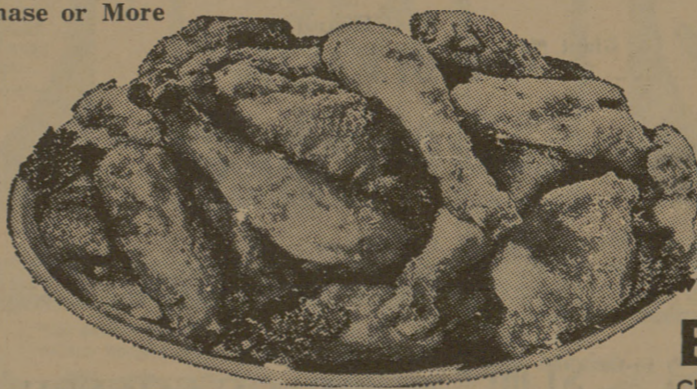
