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Birth Control Not Answer Prof Says

Dr. Robert L. Skrabanek professor of agricultural economics and sociology, told the Apollo Club Thursday night birth control is not the answer to population explosion.

"We're barking up a blind alley when we talk about birth control," he said. The increase in population is a result of "the increase in life expectancy."

He pointed out that a baby born today has a better chance of reaching 60 than a baby born in 1900 did of reaching five years.

"Today there are about three billion people in the world," he remarked. "To get the increased production we're going to have to turn to increased technology."

He said it is practically impossible to predict population growth because "we're dealing with people and these are the unpredictable."

It took thousands of years to reach the first half-billion mark, he noted, but "since 1940 it takes only about 10 years to add a half-billion to the world's population."

Rains Cause Rash Of Mishaps

Houston Woman Injured In Car-Truck Collision

A young Houston woman was listed in poor condition at St. Joseph's Hospital late Thursday after a car-truck collision on rain slicked Highway 6 at the East entrance of Texas A&M.

Slippery roads were also blamed for three other area accidents.

College Station Police Chief Lee Norwood said an Opel stationwagon driven by Cheri Brown collided with the right side of a brick-laden truck. Her car was dragged 60 feet by the truck and Miss Brown was thrown 106 feet.

In another mishap Ruby Williams of 609 W. 15th in Bryan was injured when the car in which she was riding crashed into the bridge on San Jacinto Avenue.

She was a passenger in the car driven by Emmet Clemmons of 912 Orleans. After smashing into the bridge the car skidded 80 yards, jumped across a church yard, struck a gas meter and careened into a utility pole.

Clemmons was not injured but damage to his car was estimated at \$500.

Wet streets were also blamed for a three-car accident at Cavitt and Glenwood.

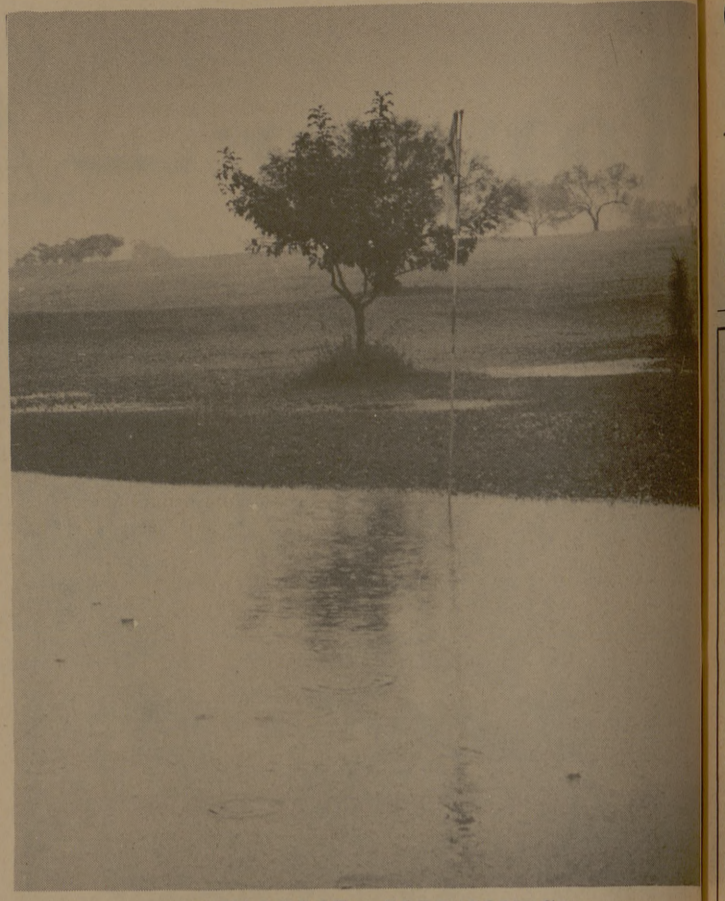

Instructor John R. Rauch of the sponsoring A&M Engineering Extension Service said the men will learn to cope with all types of disaster situations.

Other instructors include Tom W. Robinson of A&M; Theo H. Felds, chief of Houston-Harris County Civil Defense Rescue Service; Kenneth Boyd-Robertson Jr., assistant chief, Port Lavaca Fire Department; Harold R. Sorenson, Brazos County Civil Defense Rescue Service, and Gilbert Eimann, chief of A&M's Fire Department.

4 English Profs Attend Convention

Four Department of English faculty members are attending the South Central Modern Language Association's convention in New Orleans.

Engineering Service Gets \$67,001 Federal Grant

The Texas A&M Engineering Extension has been awarded a \$67,001 grant for a pilot course in industrial radiography.

TEES Director H. D. Bearden announced the one-year grant from the Office of Education of the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

First session of the unique 21-week school will begin Monday at the A&M Research Annex.

Chief Instructor Eugene Kronenberg said enrollment will be limited to allow more individual attention. A second session will follow in the spring.

Industrial radiography involves the use of X-ray and gamma rays for non-destructive testing by industry to assure satisfactory performance, improve quality and lower costs in basic production operations through final assembly. It also is used for in-service tests.

Bearden said the course is designed for training of industrial radiographers and for compilation of operational data for establishing similar institutes in other parts of the nation.

Guest instructors from various types of radiographic operations in industry, A&M's College of Engineering, and A&M researchers and scientists will augment the staff. Representatives of the Texas Department of Health and Texas Education Agency will serve as consultants.

A minimum requirement for students is a high school education or its equivalent. Graduates of the radiography school may expect jobs paying \$350 to \$600 per month, Kronenberg said.

The instructor said radiographers are needed in aircraft and missile industries, independent testing laboratories, in large manufacturing, petro-chemical and oil refining plants, and in other industries.
