

Radios To Track Deer Developed At A&M

An electronics deer tracking project of Texas A&M's Wildlife Science Department has received \$22,000 in research renewals for

Jack Inglis, instructor in wildlife management and director of the study, said renewals include \$10,000 from the Welder Wildlife Foundation, \$6,000 from Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, and \$6,000 from the Agricultural Experiment Station.

The project has been in progress for about two years at the Welder Wildlife refuge near Sinton. Goal of the research is to find additional information about

"We mounted six transmitters on deer this summer and know their pitfalls now," he added. "The new transmitters are much improved."

Researchers use a "capture gun" with nicotene salycilate bullets to immobilize deer for attachment of collars and color tags on ears. In winter, door-drop traps are used.
