"A man who has worked on a farm all his life is remarkably suited for teaching the people we are trying to help," she commented.


Applicants must be no younger than 18.

Students who graduate and ac cept assignment are sent to school for eight weeks. Language, area studies and other knowledge to go with basic skill is studied before the trainee gets a 10-day leave and goes to his foreign assignment. Corps training sites are in the Virgin Islands and Puerto Rico. Instruction is also contracted to universities such

as Texas Tech and Hawaii. The Corps pays subsistence and training costs to students in the U. S. and territories and furnishes living essentials on the job. Remuneration of \$75 a month is set aside for the volunteer at completion of the two-year tour.

"We have 10,000 in the Corps. now," Miss Halley said, "but we must replace 5,000 every year. We expect to be in another 10 countries by the end of the year. They continually request more teachers."

Community development and institution building are primary jobs performed by volunteers.


