CB Club Members Tour Utility Plant Facilities

Eighteen Brazos-Area Citizens Band Club members toured the utilities plant Tuesday under the guidance of Codie D. Wells, A&M System consulting engineer.

The \$10 million plant is operated by three four-man shifts to provide essential services including electricity, two temperatures of hot water, chilled water, regular tap water and high-pressure steam.

CBers evinced interest in operational aspects of the plant. The trip was arranged by W. C. Freeman Jr., vice president and controller of the university system. Many club members are linked with area emergency operations through auxiliary police and as radio operators, shelter managers or radiological

monitors of the public fallout shelter system.

James C. Redman, plant chief engineer, and assistant Glen Eiman aided in the 90-minute tour. Redman told the radiomen that during peak periods the plant supplies 12,000 kilowatts of electricity per hour and 5,000 tons of 42 degree water per hour for cooling purposes.

Highlight of the tour was a look at five 1,000-ton refrigeration units that aircondition the campus. Wells said three more units will be added in two to three years.

Water for the 14-degree exchange system comes from six university wells, one of which is an artesian well flowing at 1,400 gallons a minute.

Camera Club Photo Salon Judging Set

Photographs of people, nature, bowls of fruit, barnyards, and mobile accidents, fires, athletic contests and children are pouring in from four states into the Camera Committee of the Memorial Student Center.

The pictures will be judged May 7 in the annual Southern Intercollegiate Photo Salon.

The first three winners in seven categories will be awarded rosettes. The best salon print will be similarly decorated and a plaque will be presented to salon photographer.

Salon judges will be G. Minkert of Bryan, professional artist and graduate of Sam Houston's art department; C. V. (Bill) Boulden, Photographic Society of America three-star exhibitor of Houston and a Texas geologist, and Odin Clay, photo specialist of the Southwestern Camera Company of Houston.

Dr. Joe Smith of Caldwell, A&M committee member and winning exhibitor in national competition, is the top returning salon contestant. He took the human interest division in 1965 and had the second best print show. Two other category winners of A&M graduated.
