## CB Club Members Tour **Utility Plant Facilities**

Eighteen Brazos-Area Citizens monitors of the public fallout Band Club members toured the shelter system utilities plant Tuesday under the guidance of Codie D. Wells, A&M System consulting engineer.

The \$10 million plant is operated by three four-man shifts to during peak periods the plant provide essential services including electricity, two temperatures of hot water, chilled water, regular tap water and high-pressure
