

Freeway Authority To Head Highway Design Department

Dr. Donald R. Drew, an authority on systems operations involving freeway traffic, will head the Highway Design and Traffic Engineering Department of the Texas Transportation Institute and the Transportation Engineering and Transportation Science Division of the Department of Civil Engineering effective Sept. 1, 1966.

The announcement was made jointly by Prof. Charles J. Keese, executive officer of TTI, and Dr. Charles H. Samson, Department of Civil Engineering head.

Previous to joining the staff of Texas A&M in 1962, Drew was a general engineer with the Creole Petroleum Corp. in Venezuela, an instructor in the U. S. Guided Missile School at Fort Bliss, Texas, and a design engineer in the Texas Highway Department at

El Paso. He has been serving as associate research engineer in the Institute's traffic engineering research programs involving improvement of operations of the major freeways of Texas, and as an associate professor in the Civil Engineering Department.

In addition to important duties in the research involving the optimization of peak-period traffic through surveillance and control in Texas metropolitan areas on a cooperative project between the Texas Transportation Institute, Texas Highway Department, and U. S. Bureau of Public Roads, Drew also has been heading a major nationwide project involving gap acceptance at freeway entrance ramps in the merging process being conducted by TTI for the bureau of public roads.

The project involves aerial operations and computerized systems analyses of ramp traffic at study sites on freeways in San Francisco, Sacramento, and Los Angeles, Calif.; Chicago, Ill.; Detroit, Mich.; New York, N.Y.; St. Louis, Mo., and Minneapolis,

A&M Joins AEC, Oak Ridge In Atomic Energy Program

Texas A&M University has joined the Atomic Energy Commission and Oak Ridge Associated Universities in a program to

stimulate high school students toward choosing careers in atomic energy.

President Earl Rudder signed an agreement last week with ORAU for the program to begin in September and continue through May, 1967.

The plan calls for a mobile atomic energy exhibit, "This Atomic World", to be demonstrated at 150 Texas high schools. Rudder said the exhibit will call attention to A&M's capabilities in science, especially in atomic and nuclear areas.

C. M. Loyd, coordinator of A&M's National Science Foundation Programs Office, will arrange the exhibit schedule. He said an experienced science teacher will be employed as full-time exhibit manager. Training will be provided at Oak Ridge.

The exhibit manager will give lecture-demonstrations in assembly programs, Loyd pointed out. He also will speak to individual classes.

Loyd noted the program is an extension of the Atomic Energy Commission's domestic exhibits program.

The assembly presentation involves animated exhibits and scientific equipment to show fundamentals and applications of particle accelerators, fissions, reactors, fusion, radiation and radio isotopes. Lectures include atomic structure, nucleus and radioactivity, radiation biology, fission and fusion.

TTI Staff Member Authors Article
A Texas A&M staff member, William D. Franklin, assistant research economist, Department of Transportation Economics,

Texas Transportation Institute, is the author of an article which has been accepted for publication in *Military Review*, the professional journal of the U. S. Command and General Staff College.

His article, "Probability, Utility, and National Strategy," explores empirical methods of utilizing subjective probability and economic utility theory in matrix form as an aid to strategic decision-making on the national level.

Franklin is the project supervisor of an economic research study being conducted by TTI for the State of Texas and the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads in connection with the National Defense Highway System. The research deals with the effect of access on the cost of right of way.

Oceanographers Attend Conferences
Two Texas A&M scientists will attend international oceanographic conferences in Europe.

Dr. Sayed Z. El-Sayed and Luis A. Capurro will attend a Scientific Committee on Oceanographic Research meeting in Rome, May 23-26, and the second International Oceanographic Congress in Moscow, May 30-June 9.

Capurro is now in Paris, France, attending a meeting of Bureau and Consultative Committee of the Inter-Governmental Oceanographic Committee of UNESCO. He is a research scientist at A&M, involved in currents studies of the Drake Passage and southern oceans with Dr. Dale Leipper.

El-Sayed, biological oceanographer and assistant professor, will present a paper, "Biological Productivity of the Antarctic and Sub-Antarctic," at the Moscow congress.

The Italian symposium will deal with "Variability of the Sea."
