## Campus Briefs

### Rudder Announces \$41,016 Grant

A \$41,016 grant to Texas A&M was announced by A&M President Earl Rudder.

The one-year award will be used to establish a professional development center within the School of Architecture and Department of Civil Engineering.

Principal investigator is James Marsh, associate research architect. He will work under Architecture Chairman Edward J. Romieniec and Civil Engineering head Charles H. Samson Jr.

Aiding Marsh will be Richard Gunderson of the Department of Civil Engineering and Carroll Claycamp, a graduate architecture student, and several student assistants to be named.

Marsh said the center will begin operations Saturday.

"We will provide professional advice on Civil Defense programs," Marsh explained. "And we will conduct short courses for schools and architectural and engineering firms throughout Texas."

Our job will be to review building plans and integrate and improve shelter designs," he added, "guidance to architectural and engineering firms regarding fallout and blast protection in new construction will be available.

### Byers To Give Address Monday

Dean of Geosciences Dr. Horace R. Byers will address National Science Foundation summer institute participants Monday at Texas A&M.

"Weather Modification" will be discussed by the eminent meteorologist at 8 p.m. in Room 146 of the Physics Building. The lecture is open to the public, announced NSF coordinator Coleman Loyd.

Thunderstorms and raincloud physics are Byers' primary research interests. He has edited and authored numerous publica-

tions on the topics.

The first dean of the new geosciences college was elected chairman of the Geophysics Section, the National Academy of Sciences last spring. Byers came to A&M in September from the University of Chicago and is an MIT graduate.

### Anderson Joins A&M's NSC Staff

Donald G. Anderson has joined the Nuclear Science Center staff at Texas A&M, announced John D. Randall, director.

Anderson will manage research operations, with responsibility for operations and customer service.

The native Texan came to A&M in June from the Atomic Energy Commission in Atlanta, Ga., where he was an inspector. The 34-year-old scientist has experience in triga reactors, noted Randall. A&M's center has received an AEC grant to install triga power source next summer.

Anderson was reactor engineer at General Dynamics in Fort Worth six years, supervised installation, calibration and operation of the University of Texas 10 KW Triga Mark I reactor for years and was hazards consultant for Kaman Nuclear at the White Sands Missile Range in Colorado. He joined AEC last year.

### Coffee Authors Police Article

Bill Caffee, instructor in the Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service Police Training Division, authored a feature in the July issue of The Texas Lawman.

"The Search of a Vehicle" is the title of Caffee's article regarding legality of a law officer searching a vehicle. He cites several appeal cases to the United States Supreme Court in the official publication of the Sheriff's Association of Texas.

### Vet Staff Adds 2 Profs

Dr. Richard J. Hidalgo and Dr. Ralph W. Storts have joined the Texas A&M College of Veterinary Medicine as assistant professors.

Hidalgo, a member of the Department of Veterinary Microbiology, received his DVM degree from A&M in 1962. He was graduated with honors and was given the Borden Award.

After graduation, he was awarded a U. S. Public Health Service Post-Doctorate Fellowship at Louisiana State University. The veterinarian received his MS degree in microbiology in 1964 and his doctorate in the same field earlier this year.

Hidalgo is a member of the Louisiana Veterinary Medical Association, American Society for Microbiology, South Central Branch of the American Society for Microbiology and Leprosy Spirositis Research Workers.

Storts is in the Department of Veterinary Pathology. He was graduated with a DVM degree from Ohio State University in 1967, MS degree in pathology from Purdue University in 1966 and the PhD degree from Ohio State University this year.

### Henry Recives \$88,028 Grant

An \$88,028 Army Electronics Command grant has been made to Walter K. Henry of Texas A&M's Department of Meteorology.

The two-year contract is for study of tropical rainfall and meso scale systems in Central and South America. Allocations are for continuation of a project running four years, Henry said.

Henry, member of A&M's meteorology faculty since 1957, is project supervisor and works with John Griffiths and Dr. Glen L. Cobb of the department.

Research of rainfall in the tropics will allow better utilization by agronomists, hydrologists, transportation, engineering and construction firms, Henry added.
