### Air Force Gets New Head

Native Texas Col. Vernon L. Head has been appointed professor of aerospace studies and head of the Air Force ROTC detachment at Texas A&M. The 20-year Air Force veteran came to A&M from the PAS Post at San Jose State College Calif., where he received a B.S. degree in industrial arts in 1949. Head, 49, was born in Cleburne and finished 2½ years of college studies at Hillsboro Junior Col- lege and Trinity University before joining the Air Force as a fighter pilot in World War II. He flew in Australia, New Caledonia, Guadalcanal, New Guinea and the Philippines. After a six-year civilian stint in which he taught in California schools, the officer rejoined the Air Force, serving in Tokyo, Hawaii and Viet Nam in addition to four stateside assignments.

# Corps Dining Setup Sees Drastic Change

Freshmen and sophomores in the Corps of Cadets will not be permitted to sit together in the dining halls this year in an effort to curb the drop in freshmen entering the Corps.

Col. D. L. Baker, Corps Commandant, announced the new seating arrangement at the Commanders' Conference this week.

Under the new setup seven

freshmen will eat with one junior, while sophomores and seniors will eat with their classmates.

In the past all four classes have been included at each table.

Baker said harassment of freshmen in the mess hall, particularly by sophomores, was the primary reason given by 30 to 40 per cent of freshmen who leave the Corps at the end of the first semester.

"We've tried for three years to improve conditions," he added, "but last semester conditions were worse than the preceding year."

Baker said about 50 less freshmen than last year's 1,400 are expected to enroll in the Corps this fall.

But the percentage of freshmen joining the Corps will drop a sizable 13 per cent, from 78 per cent to 65 per cent.

"If we can't build up a Corps with the draft on everybody's back we won't have much luck when things get settled down," he said.

Baker announced that the basic policy regarding passes would remain unchanged from last year, with freshmen and sophomores not to be denied weekend passes because of poor grades or cadet classification.

Unit commanders will be authorized to refuse pass requests for one weekend at a time if they consider the cadet's conduct for the week justifies disapproval.

Junior pole vaulter Harris Wagenseil from Palos Verdes, Calif., will captain Dartmouth's track teams next season.

## Aggie Record Tops At Summer Camps

Texas A&M senior cadets turned in a performance unmatched by any other university during summer ROTC training camps.

Aggies were named the outstanding cadet at both Army and Air Force camps for the second consecutive year.

Aggies were chosen the top two cadets and six of the top 10 at Army summer camp at Fort Sill, Okla.

Joseph K. Bush, a 1966 graduate, was the outstanding cadet among the 1,800 attending from the Fourth and Fifth Army areas. Second place cadet was Gary W. Menzies. In addition, Aggies Kenneth W. Kroh, William E. Markham, Eloy Garcia and Terrell Mullins were among the top 10 cadets.

Of 10 cadet companies, six Aggies were rated number one and four placed second. Eleven A&M students placed first in their platoons and 15 ranked second.

Corps Commandant Col. D. L. Baker said 60 per cent of the 146 Aggies who completed Army camp were designated tentative Distinguished Military Students by the camp commander.

Fifteen Air Force cadets were honored, including three commander's awards for best in camp and 11 vice commander's awards for best in flights.

Wayne B. Fudge, Student Senate president, received the Air Force Times Award for outstanding leadership and morale traits during training at Mountain Home Air Force Base, Colo.

Commander's awards for the outstanding cadet in camp went to Noble C. Wynegar Jr., Tommy C. Stone and Patrick K. Gamble during separate camps at Altus AFB, Okla.


Vice commander's awards went to David J. Cruz, William C. Haseloff Jr., Jerry Don Stevens, Arturo Esquivel, Gary W. Foster, Kern D. Kelly, Eugene Riser II, Gerald A. Teel Jr., John P. Tyson, Neal C. Ward and Dennis Hohman.
