Editorials will always reflect the beliefs of the editor, but the editorial page itself will provide an open forum for Battalion columnists to freely express their opinions. Opinions of the columnists will not necessarily coincide with the views of the editor but will nevertheless be printed.

Students who desire to write articles or columns about subjects of particular interest are encouraged to submit them to the editor. Letters to the editor are a stimulating

Since we will sometimes object and criticize in our editorials, we expect some readers to likewise criticize our stands. Letters critical of The Battalion are as welcome as those of praise and will always find a place on our editorial page.

Since we are the official newspaper of the City of College Station as well as a university newspaper, we will include news of interest to the city community in addition to regular campus coverage.
