**Shakeup Planned
For Wind Tunnel**

Texas A&M scientists are planning to make the air stream act up in Easterwood Field's 7 by 10 foot wind tunnel.

Under a \$32,000 NASA grant through the Langley Research Center of Virginia, the Gas Dynamics Lab of the Space Technology Division is developing a technique for simulating atmospheric gusts and turbulence in a wind tunnel.

"A gust generating system is being sought to study the effect of ground winds on launch vehicles," said Dr. Richard Thomas, director.

"Even though gust tests are done at low speeds, the research ties in with space operations.

"The greatest stress on a launch vehicle comes from wind blowing against its side while it's on the pad. This is especially true if winds are gusty," Thomas explained. Space boosters are

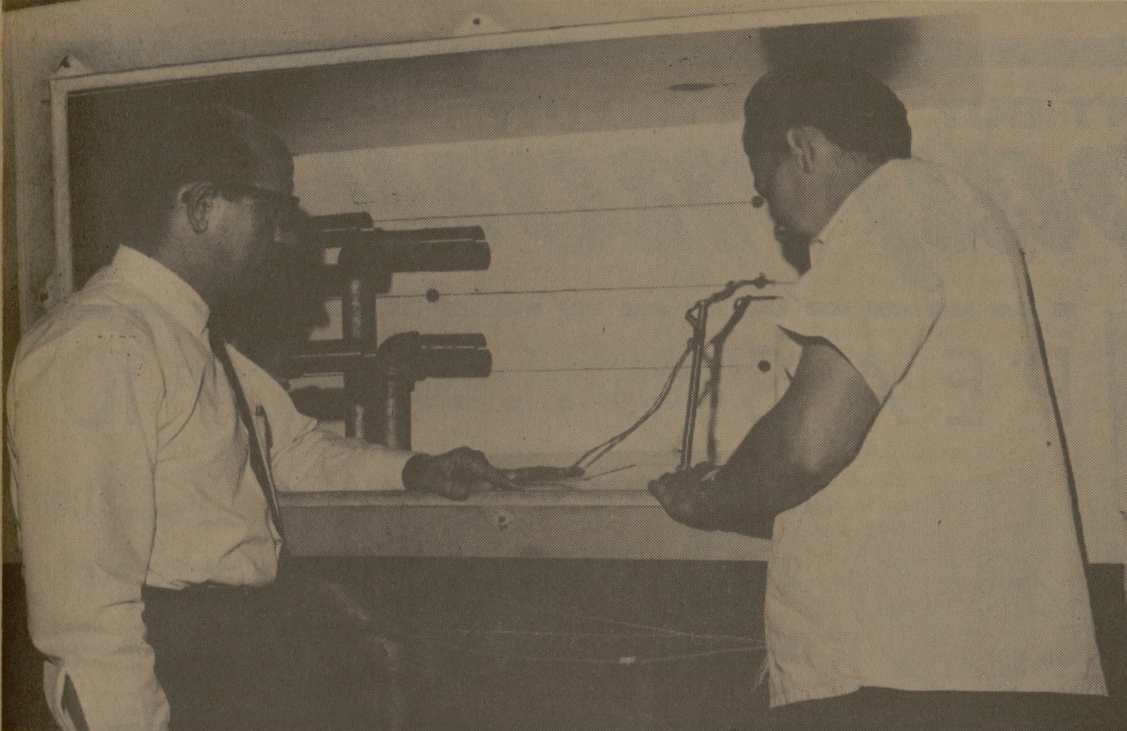
engineered to withstand flight stresses.

Lab operation, with Robert Clark technician in charge, employs an air nozzle principle in the tunnel test section. High pressure air is pulsed through the nozzles to induce simulated gusts. Initial work is done in the 2-by-3 foot tunnel in the Department of Aerospace Engineering.

"This is the first time the air injection method has been used," Thomas noted. Results are encouraging.

"We have been able to produce 18 foot per second gusts at frequencies of over 50 cycles per second in a 70 foot per second air stream," he said.

"With this capability, we can come closer to scaling atmospheric processes than methods using vanes or venetian blind-type arrangements."
