

# Stallings Pleased With TCU Game, Has Bear Problem

Battalion Sports Editor Aggie Head Coach Gene Stallings remarked after Texas A&M's opening loss to Georgia Tech, 3-38, that he was embarrassed by his team's performance—things have changed since that initial contest.

"I wasn't embarrassed Saturday night," Stallings said of the Aggies' 35-7 win over Texas Christian University. Stallings appeared even happier over the victory than he said while discussing the game Tuesday afternoon at his weekly press conference.

It was a big win for A&M. It left the Aggies 2-2-1 for the season and 2-0 in Southwest Conference play.

The Aggie Mentor was pleased with the game. He said that after looking at the game film "our offense hadn't blocked as well as it had in some games. But our defense played better."

Maroon and White defenders swiped seven passes thrown by

TCU's Rick Bridges to set two records. The seven interceptions beat A&M's previous one game high of six, set in 1944 and tied in 1950 and 1952. The pass snatching was also the most ever intercepted from one passer in a SWC game. So Bridges holds a record, too—he threw the most pass interceptions for a single game in SWC history for one passer.

Stallings praised his team for their continued improvement. He singled out sophomore defensive tackle Rolf Krueger for a fine showing. "Krueger probably played his best game," said Coach Stallings. "Our linebackers played good, too."

Linebacker Robert Cortez had one interception and eight tackles to his credit. Bill Hobbs tallied 12 tackles from his linebacker position.

Stallings is a little optimistic about the Aggies' upcoming

game with Baylor in Waco. When asked what he thought about being rated the seven-point underdog for Saturday's game, the Aggie Head Man replied, "It surprises me. They beat us 31-0 last year and their Fish beat ours." To Stallings' way of thinking Baylor should be favored by three touchdowns.

The Baylor Bears are one-half game behind the Aggies in conference play with a 1-0 record. Saturday's game will decide a lot about the SWC race.

Baylor will face the Aggies with the strongest all-around team the Maroon has seen this season. Defensively, Coach Stallings is still undecided about the Bears.

"If you put the rush on the passer, they've always got somebody open quick," said Stallings while sizing up the Bears' unpredictable offense, guided by veteran passer Terry Southall. "If

you play pass defense those big strong linemen hold you out until somebody is open for Southall to hit."

The Aggie offense will probably have a tougher time this week than in previous games. Baylor has a "big fast defensive secondary and a big strong defensive line," Stallings commented.

Stallings employed more than 40 players in A&M's win last Saturday. Emil Farr played his first down of the year in the game and brought special praise from the A&M coach. "Farr hadn't played before and he didn't do a bad job," volunteered Coach Stallings.

Farr played offensive center to spell Gary Kovar. The center position was a little new to Kovar who moved into the spot after

regular center Jim Singleton injured his knee in A&M's tie with LSU.

Kovar had been snapping the ball for punts the last three games, but had not worked as a regular center since his freshman year at Aggieland. Kovar put on a fine show, but would rather have his old guard position back.

"I'd rather play guard," says Kovar. "There you only have to block. At center you have to get the football to the quarterback and then you still have to block."

There was a little mix-up on A&M's fake punt—not by the players, but on identification of players. Halfback Bob Long was credited in earlier newspaper articles as being the man who took the initial snap. Actually it was fullback Dan Schneider who figured in the play.

Schneider took the short snap and handed forward to Bill Sallee who romped for the 25-yard gainer.

Following the fake punt Long caught a pass from the hands of Edd Hargett with a clear path to the goal. Long stumbled and fell on the TCU four yard line. After the game he quipped: "Aw, I didn't want all the glory so I fell and let Wendell (Housley) get the touchdown."

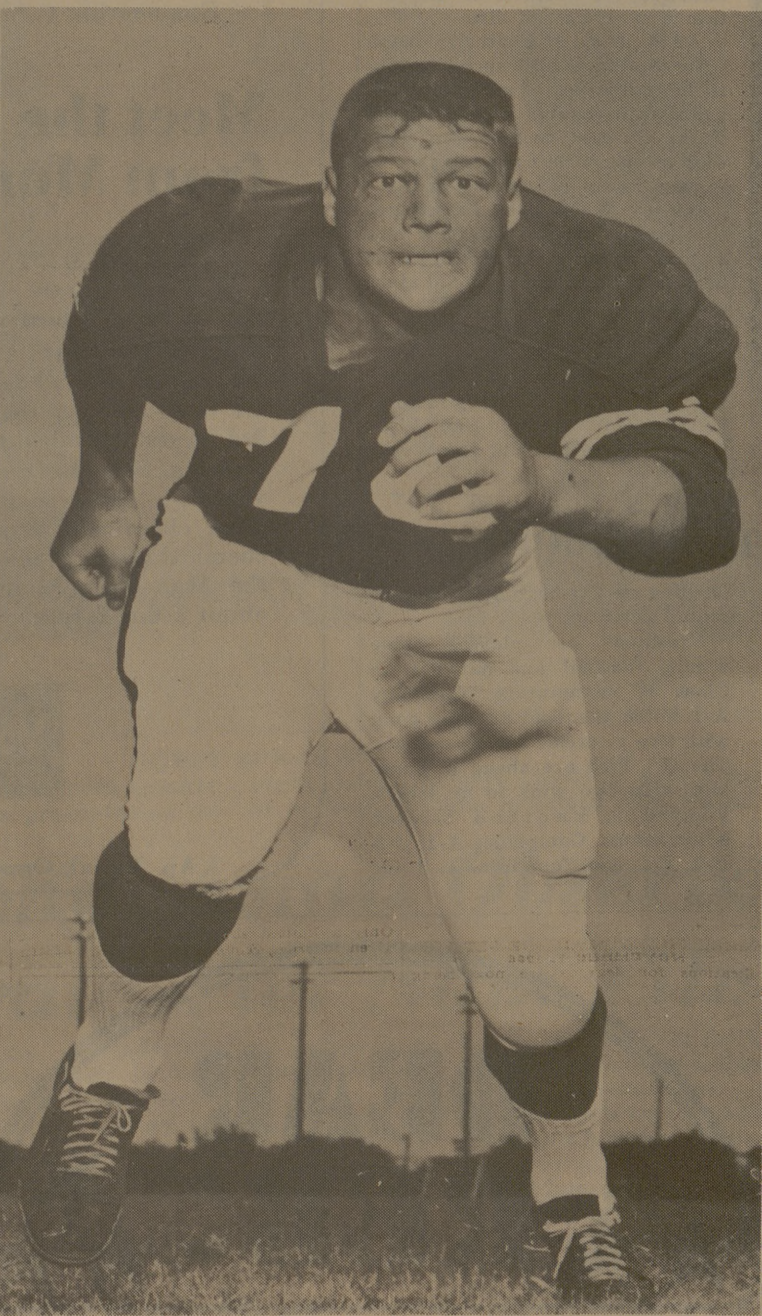
