

Bill Sallee Fills Aggie Back Gaps

Being involved in a trick play isn't always smooth sailing. At least it wasn't for Bill Sallee, Aggie fullback who raced 25 yards against TCU on a fake punt.

"I was kinda in a daze as the play developed. I crouched there with the football while those TCU linemen ran past me and then I took off. I knew the play was working but it was like a dream," Sallee explained afterwards.

Did Sallee think the play would work? "I tried not to think about it during the week. The coaches told us it had worked before and was a big play for them in the past so I guess I thought it would work for us."

On the fake punt, fullback Dan Schneider, lined up directly behind Sallee took the center's snap and shoved the football to Sallee. Sallee stayed still, crouched and riding the ball while Schneider faked a run to the right and faked a handoff to the other halfback. Meanwhile punter Steve O'Neal went through the motions of kicking. It was a big play for the Aggies because they faced a

third-and-21 situation on their own 38. Sallee's 25-yard gain gave them a first down and from there they went on to their second touchdown of the first quarter.

Sallee was the Aggies' regular tailback last year and he started there this season. But injuries hobbled both fullbacks—Schneider and Ronnie Lindsey—and this brought about some changes, one being the switching of Sallee to fullback and Wendell Housley from wingback to tailback.

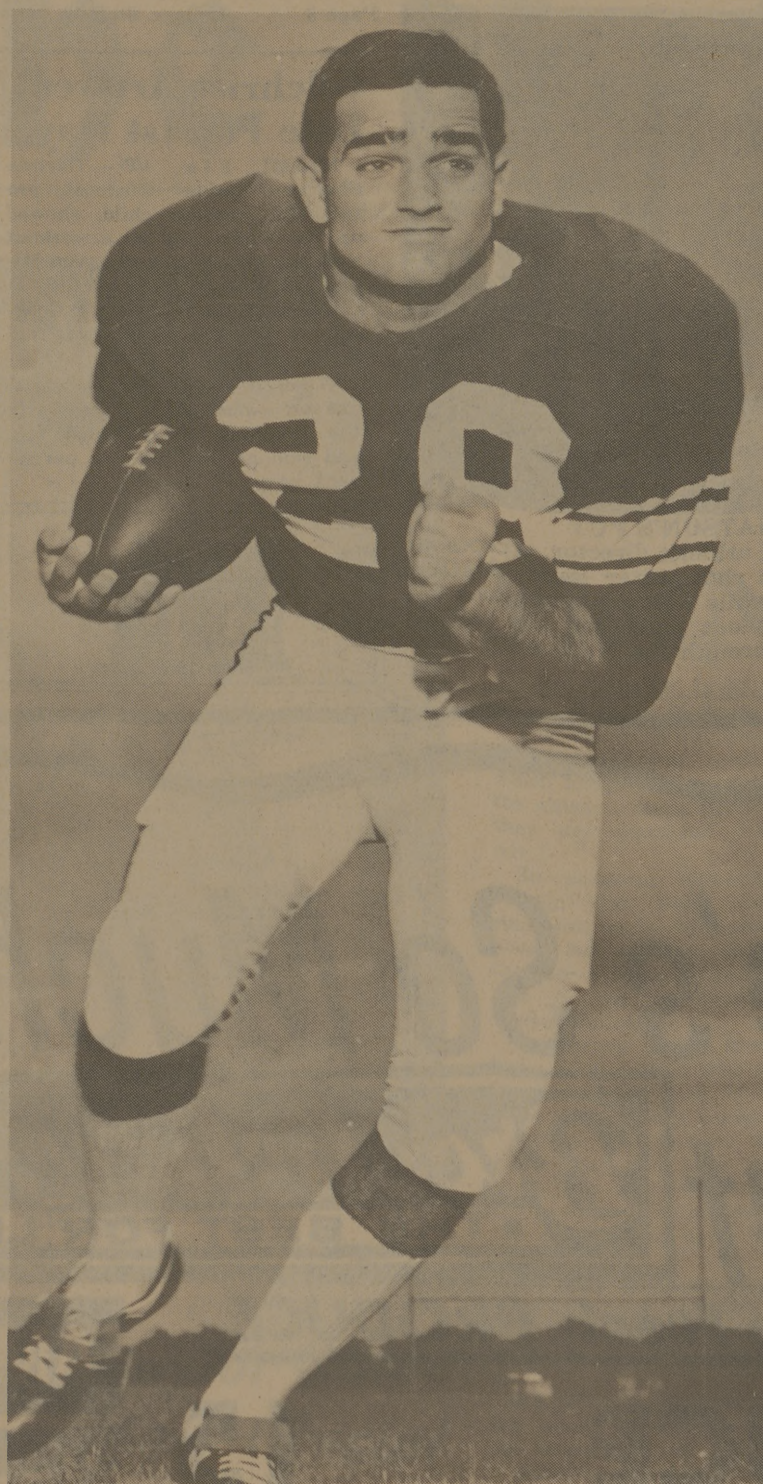
"I like fullback okay," Sallee says, "but I practice at tailback most of the time. It's just that I'm not yet real familiar with the fullback position."

Sallee was out of competitive football for two years before coming to A&M as a freshman in 1964. In the fourth game of his junior year at Midland High, he broke four bones in his back. He didn't play anymore and he finished school at New Mexico Military Academy in Roswell. He had been a very promising prospect at Midland High and the Aggies recruited him on that limited football background.

He was a regular all last season but missed most of last spring training because of a broken hand. He's been coming around rapidly this fall and may be ready now for a big game.

In looking back, Sallee thinks LSU's defense has been the toughest he's faced this year. "Their defensive ends came in tough, and actually, their defense just ran all over me." He did all right, though, picking up 53 yards on 10 runs for a 5.3-yard average against the Tigers. This past week, against TCU, he gained 40 yards on five runs for an 8-yard norm.

The 5-10, 185-pound junior is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Sallee. His father is an independent oil operator in Midland.

Yale 18, Cornell 14: The Eli will have a tougher time than Harvard, but they should win it.

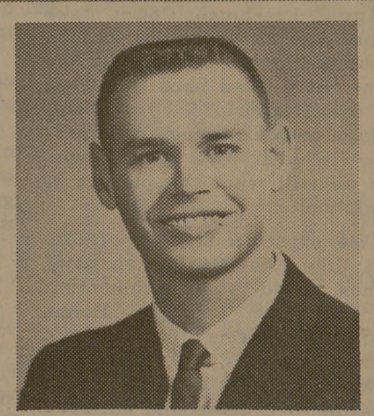
Washington 20, Oregon 8: It won't be easy, but the Huskies bound back with a vengeance.
