Reid To Present Lecture Monday

Alastair Reid, a noted poet, writer and translator, will present Texas A&M University's first fall Graduate College lecture Monday.

Reid, a Danforth visiting lecturer, speaks at 8 p.m. in the Memorial Student Center ballroom. His topic is "The Tower of Babel," dealing with language in our time.

Graduate College Dean Wayne C. Hall said Reid is one of several specialists from this country and abroad selected by the Danforth Foundation and the Association of American Colleges' Arts Program for campus visits this year.

The native of Scotland now lives in the United States. Since 1959 he has been a New Yorker Magazine staff writer. The publication has printed many of his poems and essays on Spain and other subjects. Reid also contributes regularly to Encounter, the Atlantic Monthly, Poetry and other periodicals.

An accomplished craftsman, Reid's books include "To Lighten My House," "I Will Tell You of a Town," "Supposing" and "Passwords: Places, Poems, Preoccupations." He is working on a novel, "Icsylf," and a book of poems, "Mediterraniam."

After three years service in the Royal Navy, Reid earned an M.A. degree with honors at St. Andrews University. He then came to the United States and taught five years at Sarah Lawrence College. A Guggenheim Fellow from 1956 to 1958, Reid has given readings and lectures at the New York Poetry Center,

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
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
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
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
