Tishler Wins Honor Award From State PE Association

Carl E. Tishler, Texas A&M Health and Physical Education Department head, is winner of the State Honor Award for 1966 from the Texas Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation. Tishler received the organization's highest award at the annual convention of the Texas Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation in Dallas. Dr. Carl W. Landiss, A&M health and physical education professor, presented the citation to Tishler for outstanding contributions to the organization and the field. Landiss was chairman of the award committee. Tishler, head of the department since 1947, joined the A&M fa-

culty in 1941, moving from Western Reserve University where he earned a master of arts degree in health and physical education. He also has a bachelor of science degree from Ohio State University. State association president in 1951, Tishler has served as section chairman at national and state conventions and as consultant to professional and lay groups in health and physical education. He has worked with evaluation teams surveying physical and health services in public schools. Under Tishler's leadership as Health and Physical Education Department head, physical facilities have been expanded and graduate programs have been added at Texas A&M.

No 'Happily Ever After' In Aggie Players Drama

Entertainment-seekers looking for a play with a "happily ever after" ending shouldn't see "Which Death To Die?", a locally written and Aggie Players-produced stark portrayal of the senselessness of war.

The Players' first major production of 1966-67 misses a cheerful ending by seconds.

The stronger-minded can see the Robert Stewart Jr.-authored treatise of war and heroism Thursday and Friday at 8 p.m. in Guion Hall.

Modern technology makes the plot plausible: the fact that steel can be sealed against steel tightly enough to trap air.

Virtually the entire play about five men is set in a bubble of air trapped in a sunken battleship 25 years ago today.

FROM THERE, the Players under C. K. Esten's sponsorship and Bob Wenck's directorship unravel a fast-moving revelation of how men die. The play supported by superb sets, vital sound of electronic origin and remarkable lighting affects by Cynthia Smith centers on Schwartz, played by Paul Bleau; Roberts by Paul Stewart, Armstrong by Roger Williams, Shrimp by Mike Leider and Lt. Southall by Larry Baugh.

How each responds to being trapped without hope of rescue beneath the surface of Pearl Harbor is graphically drawn by Stewart, embarking on his first full-length effort, and given exceptional credence by the Players.

Stewart's five trapped sailors show unusual aplomb in spite of the situation and don't begin to react in the manner one would suspect until late stages of the hour and 45 minute presentation.

SCHWARTZ is taken by a son he never saw; Shrimp by a "mother" who didn't offer security he needed; Southall finding a self only Roberts suspected and Armstrong by a broken heart he never knew he had. How Roberts gets it is an ill-timed occur-

rence only \$1 at the box office can reveal.

Strong-arm type Armstrong and the parasitic Shrimp are most forcefully portrayed, possibly because their character is delineated earliest. Their clear-cut characterizations provide comic relief and dominate the play. Meanwhile Roberts' is the coolest head in the unnamed battleship's innards.

Roger Williams dramatically projects the bullying Armstrong, causing Paul Stewart's rendition of Roberts to suffer by comparison.

SEVEN OF THE other nine characters in "Which Death to Die?" enter the action by flashback, a technique handled well by behind-the-scenes personnel. The Players' props and equipment rack is given a good workout by

the Congressman Olin E. Teague-endorsed play.

Appearance of would-be rescuers is possible through a double-level scenic arrangement designed by Harry Gooding and constructed by Dickenson Gustafson and his aides.

The various scenes are brought into prominence by use of spots, a technique first employed by the Aggie thespian group in last year's "Death of a Salesman."

Bryan and College Station now has a pro writer in Stewart, whose ideas have been standard fare for A&M's "Fallout Theater" and Hollywood's TV series, "Gunsmoke."

Roberts sums "Which Death to Die?" most appropriately with his line: "There's no right way to die; there is just a way to die."

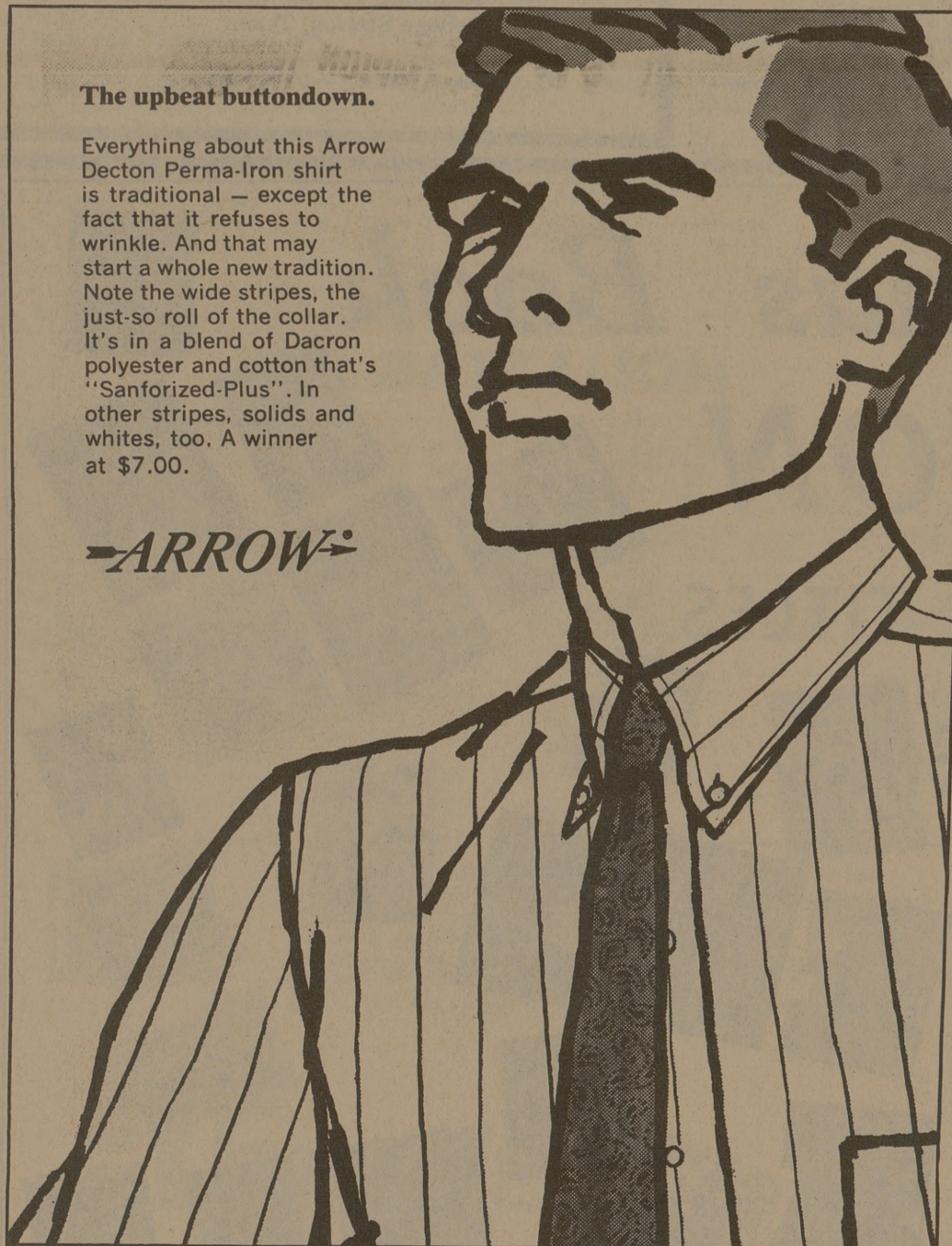
