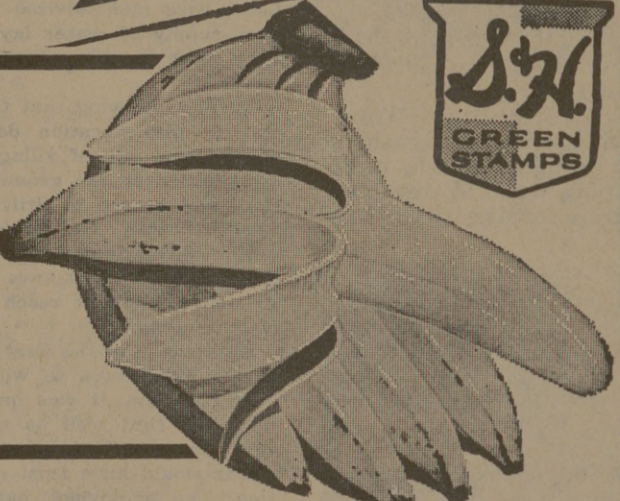

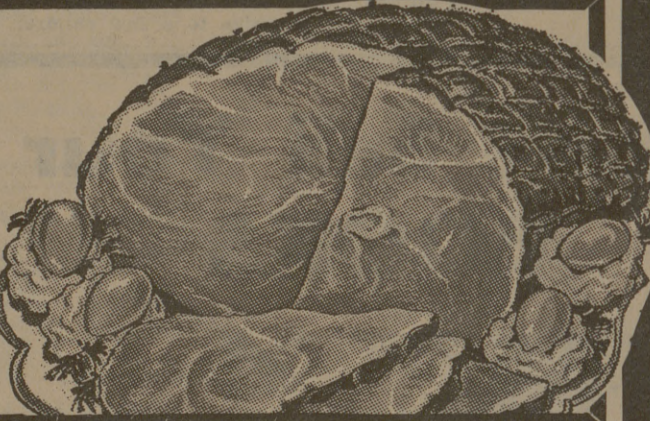

Course Offered On Microscope Set For Spring

An interdisciplinary electron microscopy course will be offered during the spring semester by the Electron Microscopy Center, Texas A&M.

Flexibly designed for senior and graduate students in engineering, veterinary medicine, agriculture, science and general sciences, the course individualizes students to operate electron microscope.

The all-university electron microscopy course is offered for the 12th year through the Biochemistry and Biophysics Department. The three-credit hour course includes two hour theory lectures and a lab.

Sample preparation and electron micrograph interpretation, photographic theory and processing and colloidal phenomena theory and lab study are stressed.

"Applications in physical, chemical, biological, medicinal, metallurgical, oceanographic and other fields are given equal attention," explained Dr. U. Grant Whitehouse, center director and 430 instructor. "Electronics is not emphasized, but both electron optics and general optics receive considerable qualitative attention. Higher mathematics is not required."

"General familiarity with experience in electron microscopy and diffraction is essential in many aspects of academic and industrial research," he pointed out.

Students desiring to take the course should report to the Biochemistry Department table for formal registration Feb. 3. Late registrants should report to Room 320, Heep Building.

Wildlife Dept. To Invade Bat Hideouts

Nicaraguan and Honduran bat hideouts will be invaded next month by a trio of researchers from Texas A&M's Wildlife Science Department.

The Central American collection trip begins the third year of a \$35,000 research project supported by the National Science Foundation.

Group leader Dr. Dilford C. Carter, assistant professor of wildlife science, said the team hopes to collect 1,500 to 2,00 bats as part of a taxonomy and distribution study.

Aiding Carter in the venture are Richard LaVal, a doctoral candidate in wildlife science from Baton Rouge, La., and Thomas Webb, a junior wildlife science student from El Paso.

"We will make collections largely in the rain forest and the Caribbean slopes of the Central American highlands," Carter commented. "We will be mostly in the bush country, not in the area where civil strife erupted earlier this week."

A&M's Wildlife Science Department has almost 20,000 mammal specimens, including bats, in its collection.

Carter said the trip will begin Feb. 12 and end in mid-May.
