## Larson Says 'Reproducers' Lead 'Producers' In Race

said.

Man stands a good chance of after the fifth contact. breeding himself toward worldwide famine unless more emphasis is placed on food production, a Midwest Feed Manufacturers Association official said here Tuesday.

He said producing food is and will continue to be first in importance, and nutrition will continue to be the feed industry's contribution in one form or another. The outlooks came from Lloyd

Larson, MFMA executive vice president and leadoff speaker at the Feed Control-Feed Industry Seminar Feb. 7-8 in the Ramada

Larson said the most vital race in the world today is between the (human) breeders and the feeders.

"Can man produce as fast as he can reproduce?" the speaker asked. "Today, the breeders are winning and widening their lead.' Quoting John Strohm, national-

ly known agricultural writer and editor, Larson said "the most urgent problem in the world today is the fear of slow starvation ... Civilization is running a race with famine, and the outcome is in doubt...

About 200 persons associated with the feed industry attended the first day's session. Larson said the seminar was the first of its kind in the nation.

Sponsors are the Texas Feed and Fertilizer Control Service at Texas A&M University, and the Midwest Feed Manufacturers Association.

Another speaker, Bruce Poundstone of Lexington, Ky., secretary of the Association of American Feed Control Officials, told seminar members that communication can be the deciding factor between success and failure.

In his talk, "The Importance of Communication," he said the Harvard Business Review magazine puts the ability to communicate at the top of its list in selecting "promotable" executives.

Poundstone urged the group to take the time to write clear business letters and not to be afraid Plant Sciences Department is of repeating information on a program to be sold. He cited a survey which indicated that 60 percent of ideas accepted came

Reed McDonald, director of the Texas Feed and Fertilizer Control Service, presented a slide picture program describing the organization and functions.




