"Those interested may contact Roger Meade at 846-3225," Ray said. "Anyone interested in entering the event may do so, regardless of the type of car he drives. We will have a class for every car. There will be a registration fee of \$3.50."

Ray also expressed the need for walkie-talkies for the event. "We will gladly furnish our own batteries if we can borrow several of the units," he said.

PEIRCE, 49, and greying himself, finds the senior additions to his class a unique experience.

"Both have alert, active minds," the English assistant professor noted. "Best of all, they are willing to have their work criticized, which the younger student doesn't want."

Peirce said 325 regularly enrolls a variety of students.

MRS. THOMAS feels a strong tie with A&M through her husband, retired entomology professor Dr. Frank L. Thomas who taught Aggies 34 years. Three sons attended A&M, their son-inlaw Dr. John V. Perry Jr. is a mechanical engineering professor and grandson Frank Thomas III is a junior management major.

"I love young people," the writ-(B) er of a recently published book of poems, "Sunlight and Shadows," confided. "I enjoy being able to sit and study them in Dr. Peirce's class."

Her primary goal, however, is writing techniques he instructs. "I'M NOT in the class for fun," Mrs. Thomas stated. "I want to learn the pulse, needs and standards of modern story telling and adapt them to my own standards and years of experience."

The silver-haired writer has volumes of experience. The daughter of a scholar and Alabama plantation owner wrote her first poem at the age of 11 and sold her first story to a Baptist Sunday school paper at 14.

Mrs. Thomas wrote for newspapers in Birmingham, Montgomery and Opelika, Ala., and has been penning poetry for the last 20 years, publishing verses in "The Saturday Evening Post," "Progressive Farmer" and other periodicals. She later wrote a column for the Fort Worth Star Telegram, reviewing children's books and was selected Progres-Farmer's "Woman of the
