Assignment of Maj. Charles R. Sprague and three sergeants to the Military Science Department has been announced by Col. D. L. Baker, military science professor.

Major Sprague, 32, became associate PMS in the Army ROTC basic division. The officer came to A&M from an Engineer Advisory Division in Saigon.

The 1957 West Point graduate earned a masters degree in civil engineering at A&M in 1961 and

is a registered professional engineer in Louisiana. He served with units in Korea, Fort Leonard Wood, Fontainebleau, France, and Vietnam. He was project officer for new lock construction in Michigan and attended the Fort Belvoir, Va., Engineers School.

AEC Contract Is Renewed

Texas A&M has renewed a contract with the Atomic Energy Commission and Oak Ridge Associated Universities to operate a program designed to stimulate high school students toward choosing careers in atomic energy.

President Earl Rudder signed the agreement which calls for a mobile atomic energy exhibit, "This Atomic World," to tour high schools in North and North Central Texas next fall.

Donald V. Jensen, a Youngstown University graduate and 1967 Academic Year Institute participant at A&M, will conduct the demonstration lecture in schools from Dalhart to Dallas, announced Coleman Loyd, National Science Foundation programs coordinator.

Loyd's office will arrange Jensen's schedule for September through Christmas, 1967. The NSF programs director said information and agreement forms will be mailed to principals of Panhandle and North Central Texas schools within a week.

Jensen, a former junior high school teacher at Fowler, Ohio, will train at Oak Ridge for eight weeks this summer. He and his family will reside in the Dallas-Fort Worth area during the year.

Faster Recording System Aids Long Distance Calls

A faster method of recording information on long distance telephone calls has been placed in effect in Southwestern States Telephone Company's long distance center at Bryan.

Called "mark sense" ticketing, the new procedure is described by Southwestern's division manager Rex Bailey as "... a purely automatic operation once it has passed from the operator's hands."

"Although the improvements realized through the new method are not visibly apparent to the

customer, this change represents a much faster more reliable and efficient means of recording information on long distance calls," Bailey said.

Using specially treated graphite lead pencils, operators record information such as the area code, the called number and the calling number, whether the call is station to station, person to person, collect, etc., on elaborately designed IBM tickets with 370 separate boxes or "bubbles." "This new method requires use of the area code," Bailey explained,

"and it eliminates the need for giving the name of the territory called."

The tickets are shipped daily to the company's revenue accounting center in San Angelo where they are fed into IBM machines which convert the data into punched cards, then tapes, and finally into a line of printed information to be included in the customer's monthly bill. The function of rating calls is also performed automatically.

The billing equipment includes an "editing unit" which sorts out tickets which contain erroneous or inadequate information. Rejected tickets are then carefully checked and rechecked to insure that they reflect the correct information.

The Southwestern States center at Bryan serves as the "master" long distance office for seven other area communities. Calls from the company's exchanges at College Station, Caldwell, Deanville, Kurten, Sneedville, Steele Store, and Tunis are also handled in the Bryan traffic center.

Three Graduates Are Winners At Meeting

Three Texas A&M graduates gave winning papers at the joint meeting of the North Texas Section and the Texas A&M Student Chapter of the American Nuclear Society.

William L. Woodruff, Edgar L. Sensintaffar and Shankar Ramchandran were the winners at the presentation of papers Saturday.

Woodruff's topic was "Critical Flow Velocities For Collapse of Concentric Cylinder Assemblies." Sensintaffar presented "The Short Term Response of the Peripheral Lymphocyte to Ionizing Radiation." Ramchandran's subject was "Determination of The Angular Momenta of Excited States of Nuclei Using The Techniques of Nuclear Resonance Fluorescence."

Each winner received \$50 from the North Texas Section of the American Nuclear Society to pay for their expenses to the national conference April 13-15 at the University of Wisconsin where they will present their papers.

Friday marked the beginning of the meeting with the registration followed by a banquet in the Ramada Inn.

Dr. A. D. Suttle, vice president for research at Texas A&M, spoke at the banquet on "The Modern Uses of Nuclear Energy." Saturday the meeting opened with the presentation of papers by the various contestants.

A tour of the Cyclotron Institute followed the afternoon presentations.
