

# Freedoms Group Seminar Is Sponsored By A&M

Texas A&M will co-sponsor a Valley Forge Freedoms Foundation seminar this summer, announced President Earl Rudder. The three-week seminar presentation of the principles of freedom, will be jointly sponsored by the Foundation. A&M Education and Psychology Professor Dr. William H. Graves will be associate director for the July 31-Aug. 18 seminar

at Valley Forge. Dr. Richard V. Allen, senior staff member of Stanford's Hoover Institute on War, Revolution and Peace, is resident director. "The seminar is designed primarily for social studies teachers and supervisors of grades seven to 12," Dr. Graves said. Participants can earn three semester hours of graduate level credit to be awarded by A&M.

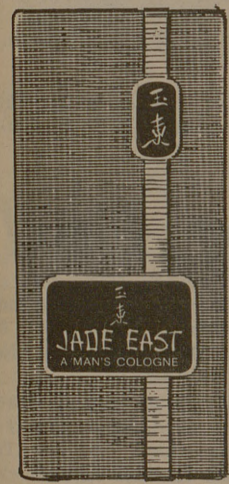
The program schedules lectures and discussion groups designed to strengthen the United States' fundamental freedoms and communist attack upon these freedoms, Graves went on. A \$425 registration fee covers tuition, meals, lodging, transportation at Valley Forge, weekend trips and teacher reference and teaching materials.

"Students needing financial assistance may apply for a limited number of scholarships," the Education and Psychology Department elementary education chairman went on.

## Smith Is Granted AEC Fellowship Continuation Here

Harry L. Smith of Decatur, Ill., has been named for U. S. Atomic Energy Commission fellowship continuation of graduate study in health physics at Texas A&M. The special AEC fellowship program in health physics will provide Smith a \$3,600 stipend for the 1967-68 school year.

The program is administered for the AEC by Oak Ridge Associated Universities.

Health physics is a field of scientific research dealing with techniques of identification, evaluation and protection from radiation effects. The field is essential to numerous industrial and governmental research and development programs using radioactive materials.

One of the 66 fellowship recipients from 129 applicants, Smith is in his second year of course work toward a Ph.D. in nuclear engineering. The basic second year stipend is \$2,600, plus \$500 per dependent.

A graduate of Decatur (Ill.) High School, the A&M graduate student earned bachelor and masters degrees at Michigan State.

He is a member of Tau Beta Pi, national engineering society; Chi Epsilon, civil engineering society; Phi Kappa Phi, senior honor society, and the Elks Club.

## Engineers' Council Awards Go To Engineer Prof, Dean

Top awards by the Student Engineer's Council at Texas A&M were presented to Leonard Lamberson and J. G. McGuire at an awards banquet Monday night.

Lamberson, assistant professor of industrial engineering, won a plaque as the outstanding faculty member of the year in the College of Engineering. McGuire, assistant dean of the College of Engineering, was cited for distinguished achievements in individual student relationships.

Danny Clifton, president of the Student Engineers' Council, said Lamberson was selected for good teaching and for going out of his way to help students. A member of the faculty since 1965, Lamberson is working toward the Ph.D. in industrial engineering.

McGuire, assistant dean since 1954, has been on the A&M faculty since 1933. A registered professional engineer, he is chairman of Region Eight of the Engineers' Council for Professional Development Guidance Committee, state coordinator and secretary for the Junior Engineering Technical Society and vice chairman for studies of the Gulf Southwest Section of the American Society for Engineering Education.

Awards also were presented to students who wrote top stories for the "Engineer," official magazine of the College of Engineering. John M. Presley won first for the best technical paper and second went to David Woodard.

Robert J. Billington placed first in non-technical paper competi-

tion. Richard L. Peace was second.

The student chapter of the American Institute of Industrial Engineers was cited for having the best overall open house during recent High School Career Day activities at Aggieland.

Mrs. Joanne Berry, secretary in the College of Engineering, was named an honorary member of the Student Engineers' Council for her assistance to Dean McGuire and the council.

Speaker for the banquet was Dr. John P. Abbott, distinguished professor of English at A&M.

Engineering Dean Fred J. Benson presented certificates to Student Engineers' Council representatives.

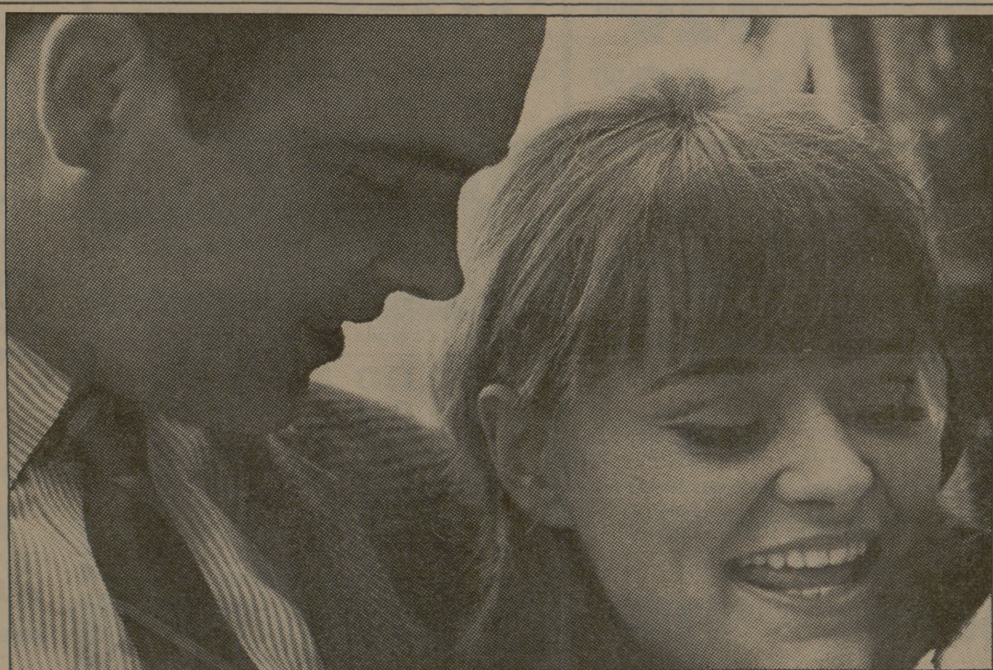
