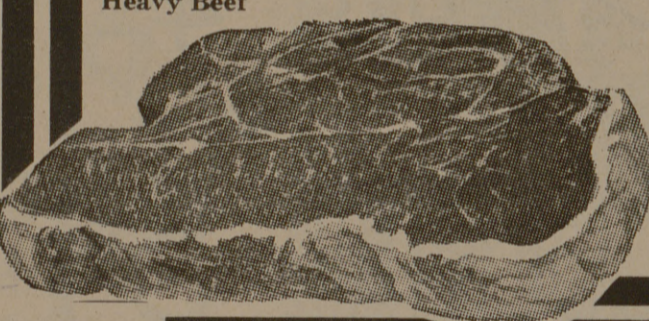

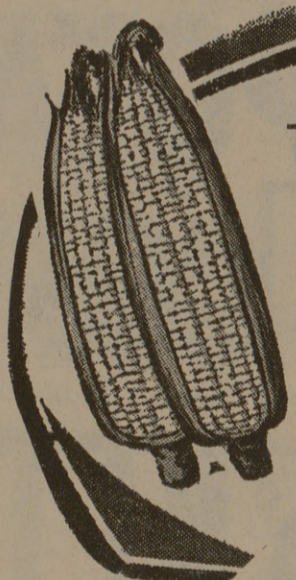

Golden Twins Are Threat In Colonial

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP) - The scribes forecast that Brewer Jr. will win. But golden twins Arnold Palmer and Jack Nicklaus posed key threats to any championship hopes on the eve of Colonial's National Invitational.
"You have, your ups and downs," smiled Nicklaus, "but I think that his game is on the swing after taking a week's rest after a week ago in New Orleans."
Of his alleged slump, Nicklaus said, "I'm not worried about it. I hope nobody else is."
With \$115,000 the prize, the finest fields ever assembled here sets out Thursday the first of four laps around the 7,132-yard par 70 Colonial Club.
Palmer came here after a week's rest as the tour's leading money winner with \$87,000, some \$20,000 ahead of Nicklaus, the Masters champion and closest competitor.
A press poll pointed to Nicklaus as the probable winner. Nicklaus and Open Champion Billy Casper the leading contenders.
And then there's the specter of Ben Hogan, 54, seeking a sixth Colonial crown on a course he helped make famous.
It was his 20th appearance here. "You get older, you play better," revealed Hogan's play companion Tuesday, Tommy Bolt, the aging thunderstorm with quick wit and the temper to match.
Pointing a club at Hogan, Bolt observed, "He couldn't play good as he does now even when he was a kid. That man does me something the way he plays at Houston."

Legislation Due On Commercial Rigging In Sports

WASHINGTON (AP) - Richard L. Ottinger said Wednesday he is drafting legislation that would prohibit the rigging of professional sports events to permit scheduling of radio or television commercials.
Ottinger, a member of the House communications and government subcommittee, said the bill would extend to professional sports events a provision of existing law making it illegal to "rig contests of intellectual knowledge, intellectual skill or chance."
The New York Democrat said in a statement he hopes his proposal will spark an investigation "of the extent to which the radio and television networks are influencing the conduct of professional sports at the expense of the viewer or listener."
Ottinger said his concern was prompted by published reports that professional soccer players "have been ordered to feign injuries or disputes in order to allow the Columbia Broadcasting System to work in its commercials."

Astro Facts

Juan Marichal and Gaylord Perry, both twenty-game winners in 1966, are slated to be on the mound for the San Francisco Giants this weekend in the Astro dome when the Giants open their Houston Astros seven-game home stand.
Perry, a 21-game winner last year, is scheduled to face Larry Dierker (3-2) in Thursday's pregame contest that will feature a pregame appearance by Hall of Famer Ted Williams on "Kid Baseball Night."
Marichal, the highest paid pitcher in baseball at over \$100,000 annual salary, is slated to face Dave Giusti Saturday night.
Mike McCormick will oppose Astro rookie Don Wilson Friday night and Bob Bolin will face either Chris Zachary or Mike Cuellar Sunday at 2:00 p.m.
Sunday will be "Family Day" with all kids, 14 or under, accompanied by a parent, receiving a one-dollar reduction on food and reserved seats.
Eddie Feigner's famous "King and His Court" four-man softball team will take on a nine-man team Sunday after the regular Astro-Giant game.
Maury Wills, now with the Pittsburgh Pirates, played four games at third base for the Los Angeles Dodgers last season.
Pitcher Earl Wilson won nine straight games for the Detroit Tigers last season.
