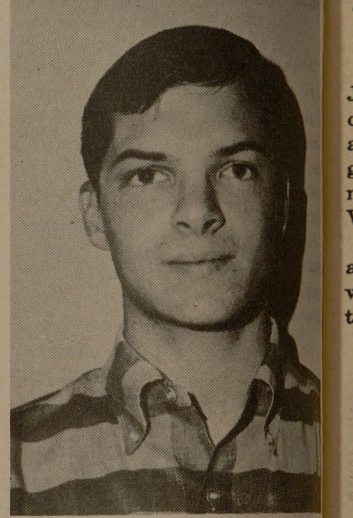

**Dinner Honors Dr. Patterson**

About 300 persons gathered at the Ramada Inn recently for a farewell dinner honoring Dr. R. E. Patterson, dean of the Texas A&M College of Agriculture and director of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Patterson announced his resignation earlier this month. He said he is considering a U.S. Agency for International Development (AID) assignment in Thailand.

Most of the persons at the banquet have worked under Patterson's supervision since his appointment as dean and director in 1961. He was cited for his progress which the College of Agriculture and the Experiment Station have made through his leadership.

The dean also presented a large book of letters of appreciation from faculty and staff members.

Among A&M officials attending were John E. Hutchins, director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service; H. O. Kunkel, associate director of the station; V. E. Scheidt, assistant director of the station; Dr. E. M. Trew and Dr. R. Potts, assistant deans of agriculture; and department heads of the College of Agriculture.

Price Hobgood, head of the Agricultural Engineering Department, was chairman of the appreciation dinner arrangements. Patterson came to A&M in the mid-30's to do graduate work in animal genetics and received his masters and doctoral degrees in that field. He was first appointed to the staff in 1939 as instructor in the Genetics Department. In 1946, he was named assistant director of the Agricultural Experiment Station and professor of genetics. He became station vice director in 1951.

He was made vice president of agriculture in 1958, vice chairman for agriculture in 1960, and dean of agriculture in 1961.

**Pakistan Official Pays A&M Visit**

Dr. M. O. Ghani, vice chancellor of Dacca University in East Pakistan, arrived Wednesday for a three-day visit to Texas A&M friends who have worked and visited his country since 1954.

Dr. Jack Gray, International Programs director for A&M, and Texas A&M representatives have spent approximately 200 man-years assisting in Agency International Development Programs in East Pakistan since 1954.

"Primarily, Dr. Ghani wants to renew old acquaintances and swap ideas with A&M colleagues," Dr. Gray explained. "Among those with whom he will visit are former A&M chiefs of programs in East Pakistan."

The chiefs of programs include Dr. H. E. Hampton, professor of soil science in agronomy; H. Smith, now retired professor of agricultural engineering; Herb Ross, professor of agricultural education; Dr. R. E. Leigh, professor of dairy science; and Dr. I. W. Rupel, retired Dairy Science Department head.

The itinerary for Dr. Ghani includes a 4:30 to 6 p.m. reception today in the Memorial Student Center Assembly Room, followed by a Friday luncheon at Briarwood Country Club hosted by A&M President Earl Rudder.
