CATE programs of a blackboarb-by-wire network and computer-assisted instruction are in development with presentation to a 15-school network scheduled in October, Moffett said.

"There is no opportunity to students in computer-assisted instruction (CAI) as of this date," Moffett added. "We have a terminal connected with a University of Texas computer and we are developing new CAI applica-

Moffett, 44, also will serve as associate professor in the Education and Psychology Department.

He was at the Gainsville institution six years, as TV station facilities manager, closed-circuit TV coordinator and professor. Moffett was principal and taught at Indiana and Florida schools 13 years.

The New York native received B.S. and M.S. degrees at Indiana University, studied for certification at Stetson University, Deland, Fla., and received his doc-




