Helps Medics Save Lives

WASHINGTON.(AP)-Army scientists have developed a sort of spray-on bandage which is helping wounded soldiers in Vietnam who might otherwise die.

The spray is a "superglue" solution which creates a tissuelike film over ruptured organs to halt massive, internal bleeding. It is used only in emergency, life-or-death situations, but has been reported to be effective where it has been used.

Development of the medical aid was disclosed in this week's issue of Army Times, a publication for Servicemen

Lt. Col. John J. Kovaric of Walter Reed Army Hospital's research institute described the

spray's use this way:

multiple wounds. The first thing he would do is to try to ease the pain and control the bleeding until the soldier could be evacuated.

"The soldier is then rushed to the operating room and the surgeon sees that bullets have hit the kidney and also severed the intestines. The surgeon's first priority must be to stop the bleeding in the kidney. By applying the tissue adhesive, a thin film quickly closes the kidney wound and the surgeon then proceeds to repair the intestine."

Medical reports from the war zone show that 15 soldiers with serious abdominal wounds were treated with the spray-on tissue.






