WACO-One of the largest state-federal real estate transactions in the history of Texas will be performed here Saturday when Gov. John Connally formally executes the \$5.25 million purchase of James Connally Air Force Base.

The 2,100-acre base, currently in the process of deactivation, is being converted into James Connally Technical Institute, a vocational training center operated by Texas A&M University.

Gov. Connally will present the documents to purchase the facility during 11 a.m. ceremonies offically dedicating Connally Tech.

The day's activities, which also mark the institution's first annual Parents Day, begin with an open house at 9 a.m. and a supersonicaerospace display at 10 a.m. The display will include a variety of aircraft, ranging from an old Ford tri-motor to a B-58.

Dr. Roy Dugger, Connally Tech director, said more than 10,000 persons are expected to attend the open house and dedication.


