

TCU Player - Scout Impressed With Aggie Attack

FORT WORTH (AP) — Leslie "Cubby" Hudler took a busman's holiday last weekend, sitting in on Texas A&M's storybook victory over Texas Tech at Lubbock.

The tough little Texas Christian University senior came away convinced that he and other members of the TCU defensive secondary face a heavy bombardment Saturday night when they play A&M in Fort Worth.

The Aggies bring Edd Hargett,

the Southwest Conference's leading passer, with them. Hargett hit 15 of 34 passes for 233 yards and three touchdowns against Tech, bringing his total yardage to 849 and six touchdowns.

"He hurt Tech with the same pass that killed us last year, to the fullback in the flat," said Hudler. "That is to the fullback Bill Sallee, who is the third man out. He was open all evening."

Hudler added, "Hargett overthrew him a lot when the pressure was on."

Watching Hargett from the stands for the first time, Hudler was amazed at the Aggie quarterback's accuracy.

"When Tech dropped back instead of pressuring him, he would lay the ball right in there. He throws a real soft pass. It doesn't look as if he could throw more

than 20 yards with it," he said.

"But I remember one time he let go with a pass that traveled over 60 yards in the air."

Hudler says Hargett is like the pro quarterbacks. He likes to throw the bomb right after a fumble recovery or an interception by the Aggies.

Hargett completed 15 of 30 passes for an A&M record of 309 yards against TCU a year ago.

However, the thing that Hudler remembers most is the faked fourth down punt the Aggies pulled that set up the second touchdown.

"We were in the game until then," he said. "I thought it was a quarterback sneak. But it went to the fullback Sallee who ran about 25 yards for a first down."

One criticism of TCU's play against the Cadets in 1966 was

the poor pass rush. Hargett, at times, stood behind his wall and counted the house before throwing.

"A&M never did hurt Tech running," Hudler noted. The Aggies made 59 yards rushing.

Hudler also was amused at Tech's play selection each time the Aggies' All-American candidate Mo Moorman would come in on defense on a third-and-two or

third-and-one situation.

"Tech made a point of running at Moorman every time," he said. "They would make it, too."

Hudler is convinced of one thing. The Aggies don't roll over when things go wrong.

"They kept coming back," he said. "They didn't give up."

Meredith Is Out For Steeler Game

DALLAS, Tex. (AP) — Dallas for the second straight week will have to go without ace quarterback Don Meredith but Coach Tom Landry said he thought his Cowboys would do well against Pittsburgh Sunday.

Meredith spent last week in a hospital with a fractured rib and pneumonia.

Landry said Meredith would work out for the first time since the injury on Thursday but that he couldn't imagine using him unless he had several days of good practice.

"I don't plan to use him Sunday at Pittsburgh and probably will start Craig Morton with Jerry Rhone backing him up," said the coach.

Morton was the quarterback last Sunday when Dallas beat New Orleans 14-10 in the mud.

Safety Mel Renfro also probably will miss another game, Landry said, but otherwise his squad is in good shape with defensive tackle Jethro Pugh, who was hurt in the New Orleans game last Sunday, coming around faster than expected and able to start against the Steelers.
