Mississippi Rights Trial Goes To Jury

MERIDIAN, Miss. (AP)—The case of 18 white men charged with conspiracy in what the government labeled "the midnight murders" of three young civil rights workers in 1964 headed into the hands of an all-white federal court jury Wednesday.

The panel of seven women and five men which heard testimony from 155 witnesses in nine days was asked by the Justice Department to convict all but one of the defendants.

"WHAT YOU 12 PEOPLE here today will be long remembered," said Asst. U.S. Atty. Gen. John Doar in final arguments. "If you find these men are guilty, you will declare the law of Neshoba County to be the law of Mississippi."

Doar said, however, he thought the panel should acquit Travis L. Barnette, 39, a Meridian garage owner, because "I don't think the evidence warrants us asking you to return a guilty verdict against that individual."

U. S. DIST. COURT JUDGE Harold Cox held in reserve a ruling on a motion for a directed verdict of acquittal on five other defendants.

Mike Watkins, one of 12 defense attorneys, countered Doar's claims, telling the jury that "the government's theory is that here in Mississippi the society is closed and so filled with hate that we murder outsiders."

Attorneys for both sides stressed that the men were on trial for murder, but on charges they conspired to violate the civil rights of two white men, Michael Schwerner, 24, and Andrew Goodman, 20, both of New York, and a Negro, James Chaney, 22, of Meridian.

CONVICTION FOR violating the Reconstruction era federal statute under which the men were tried could mean a maximum sentence of 10 years in prison and a \$5,000 fine. The state has never filed charges in the case.

Neshoba County Sheriff Lawrence Rainey, 43, his chief deputy, Cecil Price; and the Democratic nominee for sheriff, E. C. "Hop" Barnette, 47, all of the Philadelphia area, were among the defendants.

The government charged that Price arrested the workers June 21 and held them only long enough for the Klan band to capture them after their release that night.

Stinnett Published Teacher Manuals

Three books by Dr. T. M. Stinnett of Texas A&M will be published within the next six months.

The visiting professor's "Manual on Certification Requirements for School Personnel in the U.S." will be appearing soon on bookshelves.

It is one of a series published every three years by NEA, for which Stinnett was assistant executive secretary for professional development and welfare. The 300-page manual contains certification requirements for each teaching position of school systems in all 50 states.

Macmillan of London will publish "Turmoil in Teaching" and "Professional Problems of Teachers." "Turmoil in Teaching" is a 500-page history of the fight between professional organizations and unions, traced to 1902.

Stinnett said the volume is designed for general reading and will serve as a collateral text for college education students. It will come off presses later this year.

"Professional Problems of Teachers" is the third edition of a widely accepted college text that will appear in early 1968.

Wool Team Places

Texas A&M's Senior Wool Judging Team won second place in a national intercollegiate contest Oct. 15 during the American Royal Livestock Show in Kansas City.

Aggie Team Coach Jim Bassett of the A&M Animal Science Department said eight teams competed, with first going to Kansas State University.

A&M team members are Buddy Adams of Fredericksburg, Larry Boleman of Waco, Spencer Tankley of Bryan, and Bert Yarbrough of Ponder.

Adams was high point individual in wool scoring, Yarbrough was high individual in reasons and fifth overall, and Tankley was second high in reasons.
