



FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP) Vince Lombardi sent his Green Bay Packers through a 90 minute contact drill Wednesday because he thought his National Football League champions still looked a closed workout at Yankee Stadium.

"I think by tomorrow we'll be out of it," said the coach of the Packers who is preparing his squad for the Super Bowl game Sunday in Miami with Oakland's

Although the Packers are two touchdown favorites, Lombardi continued to speak with deep respect for the Raiders.

"They have a good passer, Daryle Lamonica, who has thrown over 400 passes and completed 50 per cent of them. They have good receivers and good yardage for their receptions," said Lombardi.

"They have a different outlook on defense than Kansas City had last year. We have been very much impressed by their defensive personnel. Their linebackers are smaller than Kansas City's but very active and quick. They are more of a unit of defense. They don't let you stack one against one. You've got to beat their whole defense.'
