dated cagers that lightning never strikes twice in the same place. For the second time in as many years the Tigers were knocked

out of the state schoolboy playoff picture by Conroe in a district playoff. THE LATEST time came Fri-

day night in Houston's Delmar Fieldhouse where Consolidated ended up on the short side of a 59-48 score. Floor mistakes and rebounding

WITH 6-11 Steve Niles enjoying his best game of the year, the Aggie Fish closed out their season with an 88-84 come-frombehind victory over the TCU

The win gave this year's Fish the best record of any Aggie freshman team under Coach Jim Culpepper. They ended the campaign with a 9-3 mark while TCU is now 1-9.

Niles topped both teams in scoring with 27 points while Bill Cooksey added 22, Chuck Smith 16 and Danny Berry 13 for the

Smith helped A&M to a 47-35 rebound edge in the contest with 16 while Niles pulled down 10.

THE FISH fell behind early in the game and trailed at the halftime break 48-41. They came out strong in the second half, however, to outscore the Wogs 47-36 and sack away the win.
