## Texas Falls To TCU, 10-9

AUSTIN (AP)—Texas Christian jammed five runs across in the fourth inning Tuesday and went on to hand Texas its second straight Southwest Conference baseball loss 10-9. The Frogs were winning their opener.

It required 3 hours and 16 minutes to play the game in a rain that left only 100 hardy fans to watch.

Chuck Machemehl relieved for TCU in the fourth and got stronger as the game wore on to receive credit for the decision. He allowed six hits and two runs in 5 1/2 innings.

Though the drizzling rain was bothersome, Baylor southpaw John Bevil proved more of a pest as he stopped the Aggies on four hits during this period. Then, Dykes sent Larson to the indoor showers, with his two-run blast. Bob Sanders finished up for the Aggies.

The game was played in weather, that before this season, would have forced a rainout. However, a new Southwest Conference ruling makes every game a must, rain or not.

Each SWC baseball team meets three times during the season.

FISH hurler Doug Rau from Columbus started for the Aggies and he made a mistake at the start of the game that was his downfall. He walked the Bear leadoff man, centerfielder Mike Adams. Adams scored two outs later on a single by Bill Dykes. Dykes, the Baylor first-baseman was responsible for all of Baylor's runs as his two-run home run sealed Aggie relief.

Larson, a sophomore righthander from Lake Jackson, came on for Rau in the third inning. Rau, also let the first man get on base in the second and third innings, and when two straight singles put men on first and second in the third, Larson appeared.

AFTER retiring the side in

the third without a run scoring, Larson blanked the Bears for three more innings though giving up four hits during this period. Then, Dykes sent Larson to the indoor showers, with his two-run blast. Bob Sanders finished up for the Aggies.

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Each SWC baseball team meets three times during the season.

The games are split up by one single game and then back-to-back games played usually on Friday and Saturday. If, the one single game is rained out, the new ruling states that the game cannot be replayed. Thus, the game was played.

AGGIE COACH Tom Chandler's team is now 3-2 on the year and 1-1 in the SWC. Baylor is 1-0 in the SWC (their game with Rice Saturday was rained out).

Bevil was in control all the way as he walked only two and struck out seven. Double plays pulled

Bevil out of any trouble he experienced. In the first, third and seventh innings, a twin-killing erased any chance of the Aggies getting a rally started.

Bob Long, Dave Elmendorf, Eddie Vaughn and Joe Staples were the only Aggie batters to reach Bevil for hits. Dykes, along with Rickey Head and Larry Smith all contributed two hits apiece to the Bears' eight-hit attack.

The Aggies' next action will be Saturday afternoon at Rice. The game will start at 2:30 p.m.

## New Football Seating Okayed

Not only will Kyle Field have a new look this coming football season, but student seating in the stadium is also due for some changes.

With the addition of the upper deck, there will now be sufficient seats for all students and dates, making the new plan feasible.

THE PLAN calls for the seating to be divided into five sections with graduate students in the upper deck and senior students in upper and lower decks. Other sections in the lower deck will be made up according to the student's junior, sophomore or freshman classification.

A totally new portion of the plan will be the printing of tickets, containing section and seat numbers, for the student areas. Tickets will be distributed a week prior to each home game on the following schedule: graduates on Wednesday, seniors on Thursday, juniors on Friday, sophomores on Monday, freshmen

on Tuesday and all who have not previously picked up tickets on Wednesday before the game.

I.D. AND ACTIVITY cards will be the only criteria students will need for obtaining their allotment of two tickets, one student and one date, in his assigned section.

If tickets in a section should not be picked up by the end of their distribution day, they will be available to the remaining students the following days.

No student will be allowed to pick up tickets for any other student or any student organization. If students desire to sit together at a particular game

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COCOA, Fla.—For the first time in their history, the Houston Astros may go to a four-man pitching rotation in 1968.

Six pitchers, evenly divided between lefthanders and righthanders, are in a spring training scrap for the starting jobs.

They include lefties Wade Blasingame, Mike Cuellar and Denny Lemaster, plus righthanders Larry Dierker, Dave Giusti and Don Wilson.

Houston previously has used five starting pitchers during each of its six years in the National League, but an unusual schedule during the early part of '68 may change the staff's setup.

"Because of so few double-headers and so many days off early in the season, we're thinking about making the change," Manager Grady Hatton said.

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
