B-CS Chamber Gives \$1,000 To A&M

The Bryan-College Station Chamber of Commerce presented Texas A&M a \$1,000 check for use in any manner deemed appropriate by the university. Chamber President Bookman Peters formally presented the contribution during brief ceremonies in the office of A&M President Earl Rudder. Peters was accompanied by Frank Thurmond, vice president

of the chamber and chairman of its Industrial Development Committee. "In recent years," Peters said, "the chamber has more fully recognized the contribution that Texas A&M makes to the economy of the area." "We appreciate fully the importance of total cooperation between the business and academic communities," he added.

The local organization of merchants and businessmen has made similar awards to A&M for several years. Peters said he anticipates at least one other contribution this year. Rudder noted previous chamber contributions were used in part to allow university personnel to visit high schools throughout the state and encourage the top students to attend A&M.
