

The Texas Aggie Fish basketballers upped their season record to 7-4 with a record-smashing performance Friday night as they bombed Christian College of the Southwest, 113-98.

The preliminary game was only an omen of things to come as the Aggies' varsity went on to set a new G. Rollie White gym scoring record by beating Southern Methodist, 119-98. Jeff Watkins again led the Fish scoring parade by scorching the nets for 37 points, his best night this season. Big Rick Duplantis also

dragged down 25 rebounds to lead both teams in that category.

Watkins added 16 rebounds to the Fish total as the taller home team completely dominated the boards over the shorter CCSW. However, that did not dissuade CCSW from shooting 107 times, an all-season high against the

Other scorers for the Fish were Skip Carleton with 29 and Frank Farnsworth with 23. They were both hot from the field in the first half, leaving most of the second half scoring to Wat-

counter with their usual starting array of seniors Billy Bob Barnett (6-5), Ronnie Peret (6-9) and Sonny Benefield (6-1), junior Mike Heitmann (6-4) and sophomore Steve Niles (7-0).

Heitmann, a Houston Sam Houston product, enjoyed one of the most productive nights in the history of G. Rollie White Friday night as he led A&M to a recordsmashing 119-98 win over Southern Methodist. It was the most points ever scored by a SWC team bettering a record shared by the Aggies and Texas Tech.


Heitmann hit with unerring accuracy from the corners as he poured through 36 points before retiring for the night with seven minutes remaining to be played. The second team All-SWC star connected on 16 of 22 shots from the floor in the game for an unbelievable 72.5 per cent.

Niles also enjoyed the finest performance of his career in the game as he scored 20 points on 8 of 12 from the field and pulled down 9 rebounds. Ronnie Peret picked up 26 points and 14 rebounds in the contest while Benefield had 13 points and Barnett combined 11 points with 9 re-

The Aggies outplayed the Methodists in all phases of the game and at one point in the second half pulled away to a 25 point lead, 101-76. A layup by Niles had given the Aggies the magic 100th point while a jump shot by Chuck Smith with 36 seconds remaining brought the record with A&M's 119th point.

As a team, the Aggies dragged down 61 rebounds to only 48 by SMU and outshot their opponents from the field 57.5 per cent to 42.1 per cent.

SMU was paced by sophomore sensation Gene Phillips who scored 26 points while Lynn Phillips had 20 points along with Bill Voight and Donnie Berg contributed 19. Voight and Berg also did the biggest share of SMU's board work with 12 rebounds


