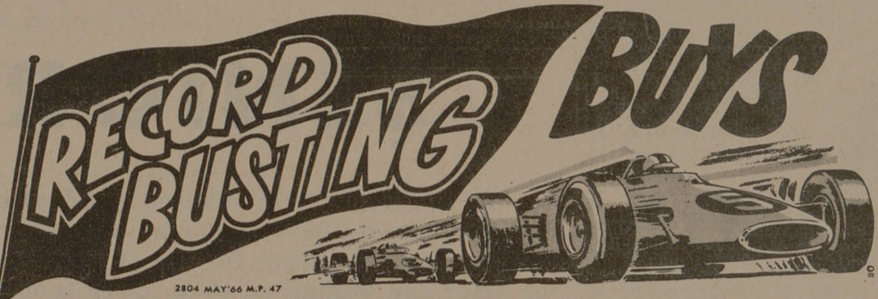

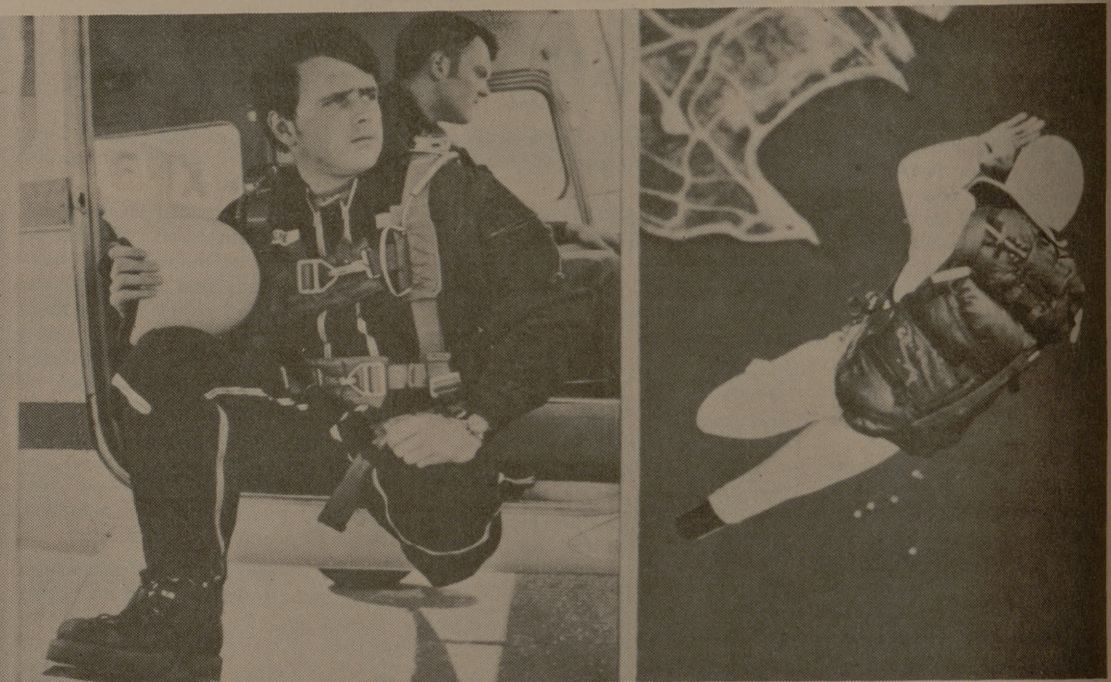

said David Maddox, Senate vice-president. "We will have a situation where each senator will represent about the same number of people. I don't feel that in the College of Geosciences the difference between, say, a freshman and a sophomore would be that great."

AFTER MORE stormy debate, a vote on the measure was called. Fitzhugh then called for a roll call vote and lodged an objection to the fact that some people were exercising proxy votes for senators who had left the meeting, and asked for a ruling from the chair. Bill Carter, Senate president, ruled that proxies were valid. Fitzhugh immediately appealed the decision but lost as the Senate agreed with Carter. The motion, passing 39-8, barely made the three-fourths vote required.

The Senate next turned to a student-faculty appeals board, proposed by Paschal Redding, senior College of Science representative, who has been working on a student bill of rights.

After many amendments, the final proposal as passed by the Senate provides for a board that would consider cases appealed to it by a student who believes he have been unjustly dealt with.

The student would be required to notify the Dean of Students within two class days. It would also consider automatically cases involving probation, suspension, or dismissal from the university.

THE BOARD, which may either reduce the punishment of the offense or uphold the decision of the Dean of Students, would have a permanent faculty chairman, appointed for one year by the university president, and could not serve consecutive terms.

Twenty faculty and twenty student names would be submitted by the university president and the student body president. Two each would be selected by the chairman before each meeting of the board. The board could only act with all members present, and a student could reject up to four members if he felt they might be prejudiced against him. "In order for students to have a greater voice in the actions of student government," explained

Redding as he made his proposal, "we feel it is necessary for students to be active participants in the disciplinary procedures. This appeals board is one way to do it. Other schools have something similar. It is important that we have this board."

A REQUEST for Senate recognition of a recently-formed advisory council was made by John Fuller, Battalion editor. Fuller explained that the council is composed of the presidents of the Senate, Civilian Student Council, Memorial Student Center, YMCA, Graduate Student Council, University Women, and Apartment Council. Also included are the Corps Commander, the head yell leader, and the Battalion editor.

"The purpose is to provide communication, and to coordinate student activity," Fuller explained, "among those students represented by the leaders named."

"We're not looking for any special power," Fuller added, "we just want the Senate stamp of approval and, hopefully, recognition by the university."

The Senate voted unanimously to accept Fuller's proposal.

The Senate also considered more recommendations concerning university regulations presented by Collier Watson and Frank Magee. The Senate voted

not to omit the words "and the Texas Liquor Control Act" from a provision giving the university permission to act when a student violates laws, to allow coffee-tea-making in dorms 1-22, and increase the wattage per room allowed in those dorms from 30 to 1000.

"THE CURRENT" advisory procedures requires adding a dropping within 10 class days, said Garry Mauro, junior year leader as he proposed a new add-drop procedure. "At the 10 Texas universities we contacted, all allow dropping of a course up until the day before the final exam without penalty. We feel that this is needed here, and we would like to recommend that the Senate pass a resolution urging the Academic Council to allow such a procedure."

Senators voted to implement Mauro's request.

Maddox submitted a resolution requesting the university to excuse those absences that occur due to the death of a relative or a close friend. Some mentioned during the recent student forum. Senate opinion was with Maddox, and the resolution passed.

The Senate also received an award from Wadley Blood in Dallas for its participation in a blood drive last year.
