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Listen Up the batt forum

Readers of "Evolution" must be aware of CCOC's extreme contempt for the Corps. Was the leaflet published out of genuine concern for the Election Commission's position, or because the candidate in question wears a uniform?

The pertinent question last night seemed to be whether the Appeals Committee has jurisdiction over the Commission. In the past, as explained last night, Dean Hannigan's decision was considered final. Sufficient precedent on transfer grades seemed to have been established so that Hannigan ruled in favor of the practice once more. The Senate decision was made in view of this, and because the election, for all practical purposes, had already begun.

I believe the leaflet represented a CCOC attempt to play upon Corps-civilian differences in order to assure that a candidate who had shown concern for the responsibility of CCOC and its publication (and, coincidentally, a candidate who wears a uniform) would not be placed in a position to influence the student body concerning that organization. I contend that CCOC hoped to insure election of a candidate who they feel could not compete with them in meaningful debate—or at least has not shown desire to do so.

I state this letter as a plea to civilians and Corps, that they not allow their prejudice to rule their ballots. Otherwise, those individuals in the position to magnify their prejudice will be able to affect, in the words of the CCOC, the "rendering of intelligent decisions relative to questions involving students and their activities."

ballot shortly after a rebuttal by Senate Public Relations Chairman Bob Burford, who contended that the ruling did not constitute an ex post facto law, as Reinert had asserted earlier.

"This rule was clarified by the Appeals Committee," Burford said, "and it is being applied to a situation that has not yet occurred. I cannot support the arbitrary decision to bend that rule to suit this candidacy."

BURFORD'S remarks were applauded by a group of around 50 students watching the proceedings.

Among the spectators were members of the Campus Committee of Concern, an off-campus organization which, Maddox told the Senate, had printed leaflets urging students to "prove to the administration that we are concerned and that the Election Commission was not acting in behalf of the majority of the student body."

Copies of the leaflet had been left in Senators' chairs before the meeting began.
