Costly Mistakes Lead To Aggies' Downfall, 14-0

The Texas Aggies, plagued constantly by costly interceptions and fumbles, punched everywhere but over the goal line Saturday as they fell to the Nebraska Cornhuskers, 14-0, before a packed house of 66,331 and a regional television audience.


"This indicates either a good defense or poor offense," Coach Gene Stallings said. "They made some good defensive plays."

Sample's first book, set for completion early next year, will be on his dozen years in professional football. The book is half finished.


