Rice Decides to 'Cover-Up' One of Yearbook Pictures

HOUSTON (AP) - A decision to use a different photograph of a nude student has caused another delay in the distribution of the 1969 Rice University yearbook, the Campanile. The student editorial board received 2,200 copies Saturday but decided to substitute a less revealing photograph of a male student.

The controversy arose when the yearbook editors disclosed that the book included nude photographs of a youth and a girl. The original pose of the girl student will be retained. The editors, the board, and the student senate, publishers of the book, had consented to the photographs. However, Bruce Henington, owner of the Henington Publishing Co. at Wolfe City, appealed to the editors to modify the copy. He also obtained written releases from the two students posed naked.

Marilyn Penelope Johnson and Dennis Rex Bahler, both 22, were among 15 chosen as outstanding students in June. The girl is now a graduate student at New York State University in Buffalo. Bahler, who did not graduate in June, is attending classes at Rice. The editorial board accepted Henington's appeal for a substitute photograph and Henington agreed to redo the page at a considerable financial loss.

Aggie Players in Last Week Of Preparations for 'Dinny'

The Aggie Players have begun their final week of rehearsals on "Dinny and the Witches," their first major production of the year. The play, directed by Robert Wenck, is scheduled to be shown Oct. 14-16 and 23 and 24.

225 Expected Here For Press Meet

The Texas Junior College Press Association expects record attendance for its 17th conference which convenes here Sunday.

Highlighting the three-day conference will be a Tuesday luncheon at which yearbook and magazine award winners will be announced.

The 7 p.m. meeting will be in Room 401 of the Academic Building.

TJCPA conference director Dr. David R. Bowers, A&M journalism professor, said 225 places will be required at the Monday evening banquet, for about a 20 per cent increase over last year's attendance.

Bowers indicated the more than 200 participants are expected from 30 junior colleges. Separate workshops for student newspaper, yearbook and magazine staffs and participating faculty members are scheduled.

"An anticipated enrollment increase for the spring semester teaching practicum makes it imperative that spring student teachers attend the meeting so that a sufficient number of cooperating teachers can be arranged as early as possible," explained Dr. Philip Limbacher.

Houston Post managing editor Ed Hunter is keynote speaker and will address the banquet.

Among featured speakers are Newsweek bureau chief Hugh Aynesworth of Houston; Karen Klinefelter, Dallas News Washington reporter; D-Eon Priest, Taylor Publishing Co.; Dr. Otha C. Spencer, East Texas State, and W. G. Beach, Humble Oil Co. senior editorial advisor.
