

# Student Attends 'Dutch MIT' On Summer IAESTE Jaunt

Aerospace engineering major John R. (Bob) Ramsey broadened his technical and cultural horizons last summer during 10 weeks work in a Netherlands university wind-tunnel lab.

While touring Europe from the Alps to the Riviera during a three-week "vacation" of the 13 weeks he was overseas, Ramsey managed to catch a glimpse of one of America's more famous

citizens—playboy Hugh Hefner—at Monte Carlo.

"It was time and money very well spent," the International Association for the Exchange of Students for Technical Experience (IAESTE) participant vowed. "I'll never have an opportunity like that again."

His low-speed aerodynamics research work at the University of Delft — the Netherlands' MIT — was arranged through the Memorial Student Center Travel Committee and IAESTE. Though the foreign work experience is the program's major goal, it also seeks to establish international understanding and goodwill among the potential leaders and host companies and institutions.

Information for A&M engineering and science students interested in the program will be available at a Nov. 11 meeting in the Memorial Student Center. Ramsey and Barry Whitehead of San Antonio, architecture student who

worked in London, will present a slide show on their experiences.

"I biked around Delft and on weekends took train trips to The Hague, Amsterdam and Rotterdam. There aren't many windmills left and we only saw a couple of people wearing wooden shoes, though I was told there are quite a few of them left," he remarked.

Following the 10 weeks work at Delft, Ramsey and two friends bought a mail van at auction and traveled for three weeks. The A&M student who expects to graduate in January and go to Chanute AFB, Ill., for technical school as an aircraft maintenance officer said one stop was in East Berlin.

"The police came after us while we were taking pictures of the wall from the East Berlin side," he described. "They were going to confiscate our film, but I talked them out of it."

## SWTSU Student Senate Calls For 'Improvement' of Paper

SAN MARCOS, Tex. (AP)—The Southwest Texas State University Student Senate, saying some feel the student newspaper has helped create unrest on campus, has asked for steps to improve it.

The action sparked a petition drive on campus Tuesday supporting the newspaper's editorial policies.

The Senate passed a resolution Monday requesting the school's publications committee to "research ideas to improve the quality of the College Star."

The resolution stated that "recent events" at the college "have caused a general feeling of unrest and distrust among students, faculty and administration."

The resolution continued:

"Some students feel that the College Star has helped to create this unrest by not expressing a variation of viewpoints in relation to events on this campus, and that the College Star is no longer a newspaper of highest quality because of this."

Dr. Frank Buckley, chairman of the 11-member publications committee, said the body will meet on the matter late this week or early the next.

The school's journalism department has received complaints from some students that some articles in the Star were biased, some letters to the editor had not been printed and that some cartoons had given distorted views.

Members of the paper's staff said all letters had been printed.

# University Nominates Tefteller For '70 Rhodes Scholarship

Ronald Tefteller of Midland, senior agricultural economics major, has been selected to represent the University as the 1969-70 Rhodes Scholarship nominee.

The student's selection qualifies him to compete with other outstanding scholars from major universities throughout the United States for the internationally famous award. Thirty-two Rhodes Scholars-elect will be announced in late December.

Richard H. Ballinger, A&M professor of English and institutional representative for the award, said the university has produced

two Rhodes Scholars, one in 1922 and another in 1946.

The scholarship usually covers a two-year period and provides about \$3,000 per year for study at Oxford University in England.

Tefteller has been designated a "Distinguished Student" every semester at Texas A&M. He is a member of Alpha Zeta, Phi Kappa Phi and Gamma Sigma Delta honorary fraternities and was recently selected to appear in the 1970 edition of "Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges."

The 22-year-old scholar has served as delegate to the Student

Conference on National Affairs (SCONA) and to the World Affairs Conference at Texas University. He also is a member of the Agricultural Economics Club and a past member of Great Issues Committee.

Tefteller is scheduled to graduate in January and plans to enroll in the Baylor University School of Law. He said if he receives a Rhodes Scholarship, will continue at Baylor until October, when he will go to England and apply for admission to the Honour School of Jurisprudence of Oxford University.

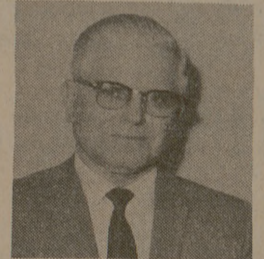

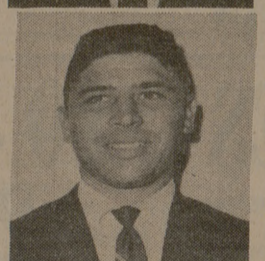

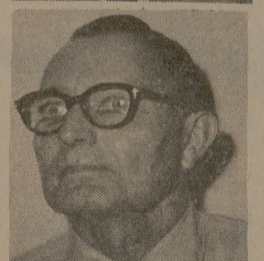
