 plementary budget request for \$3,500 to the council.

The money was needed, he said, to cover expenses already brought about by speaker commitments. Part of the money, he said, will go to finance a spring seminar on U.S.-Eastern European relations. The council approved the budget with little debate.

In other business, the council: —Accepted gifts totaling \$587. —Made provisions for a faculty adviser on the ski trip scheduled for the semester break in January.

Campus Briefs

Day Student Forms Available Monday

Applications for day student permits will be accepted in the Housing Office from 8 a.m. Monday until noon Dec. 1, according to Don R. Stafford, associate dean of student affairs.

Automatic permission will be given graduates, he said, as well as married students and students living with their immediate family, and exceptions will be made for medical reasons when verified by a university physician.

Stafford added that students who work may be excepted because of hours worked, eating arrangements or living arrangements.

Beginning with juniors and seniors, additional considerations will be handled on an individual basis, he said.

"If the room situation is critical," he explained, "people who do not fit these conditions may be granted permission to live off campus for the University's convenience."

Students who have not been

notified by Dec. 15 may check with the Department of Student Affairs, he said.

"Several students now living as day students will have their permits revoked at semester's end if a letter from their parents granting permission to live off campus is not filed at the Student Affairs Office," he said, noting that about 75 students will be affected.

Student Travel Meeting Tonight

Students interested in participating in the summer student exchange program, International Association for the Exchange of Students for Technical Experience (IAESTE), are urged to attend a Travel Committee meeting tonight at 7:30 p.m. in Room 3B of the Memorial Student Center.

Committee Chairman Paul Scopel noted that the meeting was part of Travelfest, a week-long series of displays and activities in the MSC which emphasize the advantages of travel abroad.

Electron Microscopy Course Offered

An electron microscopy-diffraction course structured for senior and graduate students in engineering, veterinary medicine, agriculture, science and geosciences will be offered at Texas A&M next spring for the 15th consecutive year.

Handled as Biology 430, the course will familiarize students of various academic fields with general theoretical aspects and specific applications of electron

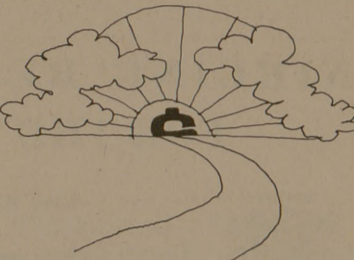
microscopy and electron diffraction, according to Dr. U. Grant Whitehouse, A&M's Electron Microscopy Center director and course instructor.

He noted that the spring semester course will take advantage of new facilities of the center, located in the biological sciences building addition.

He said senior or graduate standing is suggested although junior and sophomore level students with outstanding scholastic records are accepted upon recommendation of the student's departmental adviser.

There are no course prerequisites for Biology 430. Elementary college physics is suggested but not required.
