encounter a fired-up band of Aggies with upset visions in their eyes, and you can bet your turkey dinner that the Steers will have sobered up from their hasty national ascent by the 1:30 p.m. kickoff. Although they lead in the overall series 52-18-5 the Horns stand but 13-12-1 in the Aggies' domain.
The Longhorns didn't linger in second place in the nation because they lacked talent. On the contrary, they have been beating people this year with their second and third units which means their rushing attack is

crushing their foes early enough to allow their subs to finish the job.
A&M will pit a pretty rugged defensive unit against the nation's top rushing attack. Oddly enough, only two Texas rushers are even listed among the top ten conference rushers because they generally spread their yardage among about ten players. Quarterback James Street runs their "Wishbone T" offense like he was born to and running backs Ted Koy, Steve Worster and even sophomore Jim Bertlesen make people wonder why anyone

ever used the regular T in first place.
The Aggies will counter a varied attack, though not all season, very capable of winning the football. Against Texas the No. 2 team in the country, A&M rolled up their offensive totals of the year with sophomore quarterback Rocky Self at the controls, passing lanes could be satiated. Senior tailback Larry Steg will key the Aggies' ground assault with help from sophomore fullback Marc Black. Steg picked up 641 yards this year. Black has added 226 to his fourth best running game in SWC.
