## To Prevent Oil Spillage Study Begun Container

broad-based research program to develop techniques for containing oil spillage such as occurred earlier this year off the coast of Santa Barbara, Calif.

Engineering Dean Fred Benson said the university will conduct the project under a \$285,000 contract awarded by the U.S. Coast Guard to Wilson Industries, Inc., an oil-oriented firm based in Houston.

J. L. H. (Red) Rountree, general manager of Wilson Industries' Marine Systems Division, said the Coast Guard award covers a six-month period for the concept and model development phase of the overall project.

Subsequent phases, in which Wilson Industries and the university hope to participate, involve prototype development and tests at sea and, finally, con-struction of full-scale containment devices.

Benson said the first-phase contract calls for development of both lightweight and heavy-duty systems for oil spillage contain-

In addition to stopping the spread of oil resulting from rare seepage in offshore drilling operations of the Santa Barbara type, the dean said the system must also cope with incidents such as occurred when the tanker Torrey Canyon broke up off the coast of Scotland two years

While the Coast Guard contract was awarded to Wilson Industries, Rountree emphasized both the firm and the university joint-
