Aggies, Bears Clash Saturday Night

It could be a little premature, but Saturday night's clash against the Baylor Bears could prove to be the 1970 turning point for Shelby Metcalf's Texas Aggies in the defense of their conference throne.

The 1968-69 SWC champs will have their hands full with the 8-3 Bears, who bring an outstanding team to G. Rollie White for the 8 p.m. tip-off. Because Baylor and A&M could very well be battling for the conference title come late February and early March, a win at this stage for either one may give the other the edge they need.

"We'll have to play them honestly," Metcalf said, "because they are such a well-balanced team. They can all shoot and they are all good athletes so we won't be able to concentrate on

just one man to stop their offense."

Willie Chatmon, a 6-6 junior college transfer from Tyler, has proven to be the catalyst this year in the revived Bear attack.

"I think that Chatmon has been the big difference in their team this year," Metcalf continued. "He is the leading rebounder in the conference and one of the top shooters from the field in the nation."

Unfortunately, the Aggies will not be able to focus all their attention on Chatmon because of the fine balance the Bears showed in their opening 81-58 thumping of pre-season conference leader Texas. Larry Gatewood, a 6-5 forward hit for 24 points against the Longhorns and Tom Stanton, a sophomore guard gave them the leadership they needed at that position. Other starters for the Bears will be 6-5 Tommy Bow-

man, a two-time All-SWC selection at forward, and either Tom Friedman (6-4) or Pat Fees (6-7).

The streaking Aggies have now won their last four straight, all of them on the road, and that includes Tuesday night's conference win over Arkansas, 64-59, in Fayetteville.

"They (Baylor) will show us a lot of multiple defenses," Metcalf said, "but our squad this year is a pretty smart group and

I think they'll be ready."

A&M is averaging 76 points per contest this year with 6-4 senior captain Mike Heitmann leading the scoring parade with a 19.2 norm. Junior center Steve Niles is next at 13.3 with an average of 10.4 rebounds and Bill Cooksey at 12.8 and Chuck Smith at 12.7 give the Aggies four starters averaging in double figures. Pat Kavanaugh, the 6-0 playmaker is hitting at a 5.7 clip.

Baylor's record has been enhanced this season by prestigious wins over New Mexico State and Wyoming, both nationally ranked. The Aggies, now 6-4 for the year, hold wins over Clemson, Furman, and Northwestern.

All reserve seat tickets for the game were gone Thursday with general admission gates scheduled to open at 5:30 p.m. Saturday. The gates will again be closed when basketball capacity of some 7,600 is reached.

Fish Seek Third Straight As Cubs Invade G. Rollie

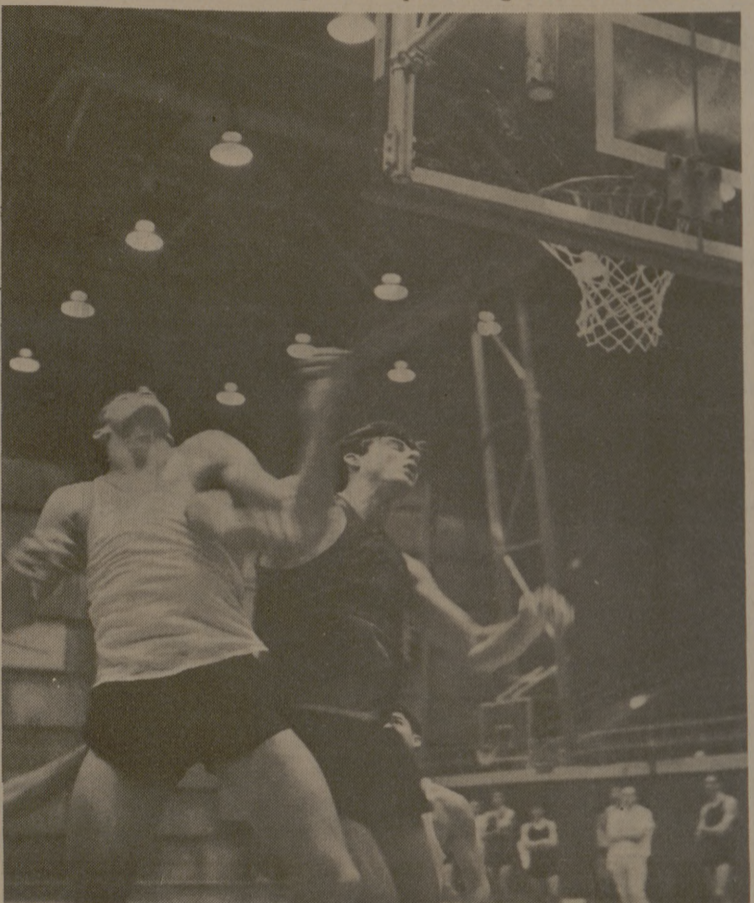
The Texas Aggie Fish take an undefeated record into the first meeting with the Baylor Cubs tomorrow night in G. Rollie Coliseum at 5:45. The Fish have beaten Blinn Junior College and

Wharton County Junior College for their two wins, while the University of Texas at Austin Yearlings outlasted the Cubs 91-87, in their last outing.

Jeff Overhouse is the leading scorer for the Fish averaging 23 points a game. He has sank 14

of 16 free throws. The 6-6 point man also has 24 rebounds in two games.

Also playing well for the Fish have been Bob Gobin and O'Brien. The twosome have combined to give the Fish one of the best ball handling combinations in the conference. Neither the two are slouches when it comes to finding the range to the basket. Gobin has bombed 22 points from his point position while O'Brien has added 21 points in the two games.

The other two starting players have also contributed key points and rebounds in the pre-conference success. Bryan Mezger has hit 15 points, but has pulled 22 rebounds to place himself in a runner-up position to Overhouse. Meanwhile Wayne Howard has chipped in 10 points and snagged 13 rebounds.

Coach Jim Culpepper also received good play from the bench in Charlie Jenkins and Ron Eeten. Jenkins has a season total of 13 points, but has been valuable in giving the members of the starting five some rest time. Eeten has pulled in nine rebounds, while snatching 11 points for the young season.

The Baylor Cubs fought hard behind against the Yearlings, almost pulled off an upset. The Cubs have two good players, Mark Bader and Jim Sanders. Last year, the Cubs gave the Fish two lickings, as then Freshman Pat Fees rallied his Cubs to the wins.

But this year it could be a different story when the two meet Saturday.

A&M Rugby Team Hosts Dallas Club

The Texas A&M Rugby Club will host the Dallas Rugby Club on Kyle Field at 3 p.m. Saturday with several Aggie football prospects scheduled to watch the clash.

Assistant Athletic Director Marvin Tate will escort a schoolboy football prospect to the unusual sport, which is a blend of both football and soccer without pads.

The Aggie Rugby team was 29-6 last year with a 5-3 mark in the Texas Rugby League, nine-member organization. There will be no admission charge.

Steve O'Neal, a rookie from Texas A&M, got off a 98-yard punt for the New York Jets in their game against the Denver Broncos. The ball hit the 30-yard line and bounded to the Denver one.

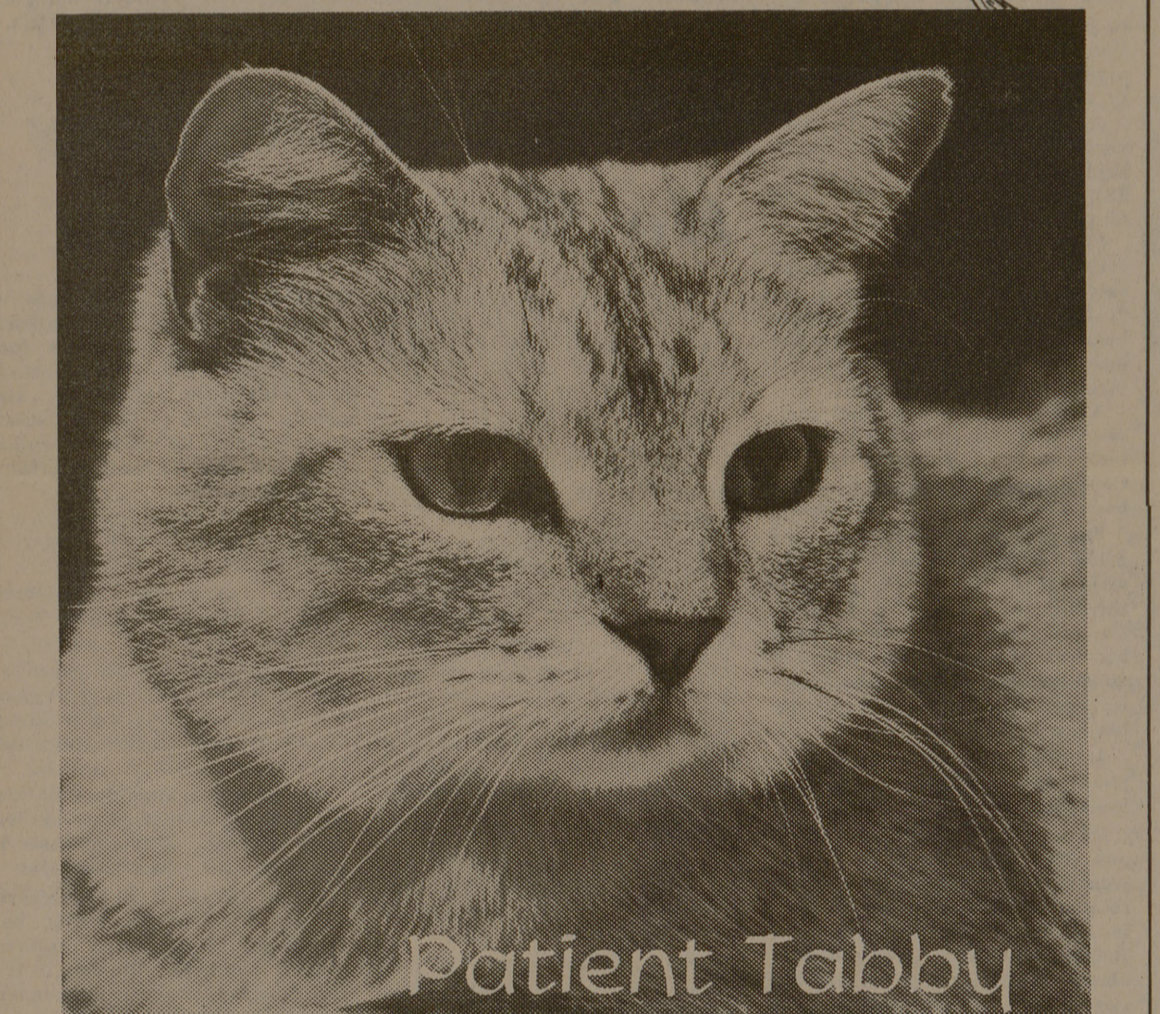
The Church..For a Fuller Life..For You..
