Ten Navajo Indians have begun the Bureau of Indian Affairs unan eight-week basic telephone training program that for the first time guarantees the graduates a job on their Arizona reservation.

Chief instructor Charles Whitaker of the Telephone Technicians Training Department of the Texas Engineering Extension Service points out "it is our first attempt at pre-employment training. In the past, our courses have been for men who are sent by a company for upgrading or special technical training after several years employment."

Government telephone technicians will transfer to other federal systems, leaving an urgent need for trained employes, Whitaker reports.

Whitaker reported the young men receive \$184 a month allowance and travel expenses from the Bureau of Indian Affairs. The subsistence allowance pays for room, board and laundry while at the A&M school.
