But close behind him was A&M's do-it-all sprinter Rockie Woods who garnered a first in the 100 yard dash, a third in the 220, anchored the sprint relay team and even ran fourth in the high hurdles. Marvin Mills, Curtis' brother, also ran on the sprint relay, finished second in the 220 and second in the 100.

The sprint relay unit streaked to a 39.8 clocking to lower the conference mark of 40 flat held by Texas. Mills turned on a belated charge to edge Texas' Dave Morton in the 440 with a




