Menke lead baseballers will be strong again next year Astros past Dodgers, &

The Texas Aggies will be back. Yes Coach Tom Chandler's Aggie baseball club which just completed the best season win wise in A&M history will be back nearly intact and probably stronger.

Only three seniors played their last game with the Aggies against Texas last weekend.

Dave Benesh ended his career with a 6-4 mark after being named to the All-SWC team last year with a 5-1 record and a 1.70 earned run average that was the third best in the conference.

Benesh teamed with another of the seniors, Jim Raley when the two played for St. Thomas high school in Houston.

Raley who had problems with the bat hitting only .195 this year was a valuable asset in the Aggie defense, one of the big differences between the Aggies of 1969 that had a 7-8 conference record and the 1970 team that lost only 9 games in 34 starts all year.

He committed only 3 errors in 92 chances and at times his accurate throws and flawless fielding made him seem like a polished machine.

Boyd Hadaway one of the team leaders in home runs with five and runs batted in with 22. The silent senior finished his career with a .259 average drawing six walks in the Texas series.

The Aggies hopefully will have ample depth to replace Benesh as they have some good strength returning at the position including several junior college transfers who didn't get a chance to start because of the effectiveness of Benesh and Doug Rau.

Paul Czerwinski from San Jacinto, Pat Jamison from Blinn and Hardy Frazier from Panola all have experience as starters from their junior college days but only Frazier was given a starting opportunity.

Frazier had a 2-0 record with a 2.73 e.r.a. and Czerwinski a 1-1 ledger with a 1.59 e.r.a. Jamison who did not start a game had a 1-1 record with three saves.

Charles Kelley will be at the front of the line for a starting job next season after finishing up this season without allowing an earned run in 19% innings. His four saves was the team high and after allowing an unearned run against Sam Houston in the Aggies first game of the year



Catcher Billy Hodge was a pleasant surprise for the Aggies hitting .340 cracking five home runs and leading the team with 25 rbi's. A year ago as a sophomore Hodge had batted only .171 but stepped into do a king sized job in his first year as a starter.
