

# 4 track prospects visit A&M

Four outstanding high school track and field performers will visit Texas A&M this weekend as the Aggies try to strengthen the field events and hurdles for next season and to add to their record-breaking sprinters and relays.

The Aggie track team will divide into two units with one group going to the Freedom Games in Philadelphia and the others traveling to Beaumont for the Ty Terrell Relays.

Three of the four high school stars who will be on hand won events last week at the Class AAAA University Interscholastic League state track and field meet and the fourth, a two time state champ, missed the meet because of an injury.

Charles Stidham, a broad jumper from Dallas Crozier Tech, two time AAAA broad jump champion, missed the state meet because he was injured although his best jump of the year, 24-4, was longer than the winning jump in the meet.

Gary West, of Odessa Permian, won two events in the meet, taking first place in the 120 yard high hurdles and the 330 yard intermediate hurdles. He equaled the state record in both events running the high hurdles in 13.6 and the intermediates in 37.6. The intermediate record which he tied was set last year by Mike Cronholm of Lake Highlands high school in Richardson. Cronholm was the 440 yard hurdles champion in the Southwest Conference this spring for the Rice Owls.

Bill Curnow, pole vaulter from Midland Lee, broke the state pole vault mark by springing over the bar at 15-6. He had vaulted 15-9 on one occasion. The old record was set by another Rice freshman star last year as Conroe's Dave Roberts cleared the bar at 15-2.

High jumper Johnny Blakney could be what the Aggies need to sweep the top four spots in the SWC high jump after taking three of the four spots this season. The leaper from Fort Worth Southwest bettered the state mark of 6-8½ by two inches with a jump of 6-10½ and barely missed clearing the bar at 7-1½.

Coach Charlie Thomas has announced the signing of two athletes for next season as a couple of junior college milers joined

the Aggies.

Frankie Ybarbo of Blinn and Mike Moncivaz of Glendale, Arizona Junior College have run a 4:10 mile this year.

Thomas also said the Aggies have lost sprinter Ken Curl who signed a letter of intent with the

Harold McMahon will lead off for the Aggies and Curtis and Marvin Mills will follow up.

The Mills brothers, who have become nationally famous for their track exploits this season, are featured in a second major national sports publication in less than a month in the May 16 issue of The Sporting News. Sports Illustrated featured the Aggies in the May 4 issue.

Eight other members of the track squad will be at the Ty Terrell relays in Beaumont.

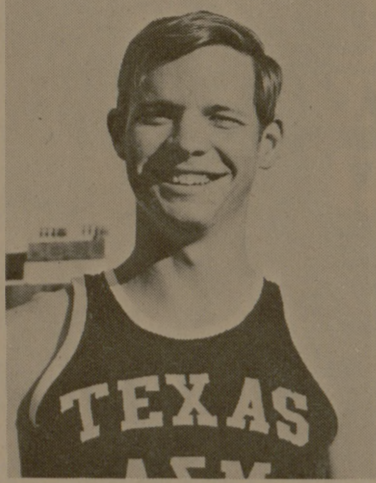
Donny Rogers will run in the 120 high hurdles and David Morris will run the 440 yard hurdles. Both are nearing the qualifying time for their events to the national meet.

Coach Thomas is hopeful they can make it because it will give the Aggies some standby strength for the relays in case of an injury.

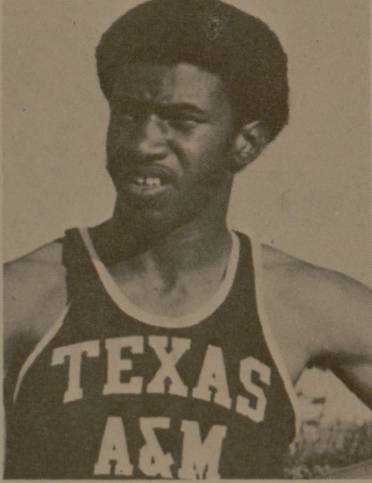
Marvin Taylor, who has qualified for national with a 6-9 high jump, and John Taylor will high jump for A&M.

Aggies last Wednesday but signed a national letter which is binding with Stanford Tuesday.

The addition of the two milers plus the possibility of adding points in the broad jump, where A&M didn't score last year, will be a great help to go with the Aggies' sprinters who finished 1-2-3 in the SWC meet and set a relay record in the 440 yard relay.

West can add strength to A&M's hurdles chances where the Aggies qualified three for the finals in the high hurdles and would give them three real strong 440 hurdlers since they have Don Kellar (50.6) and David Prince (51.7) returning. Both have qualified for the nationals but Kellar, who pulled a muscle and missed the conference meet, may not be back in time for the meet in June.

Curnow could help the Aggies pick up some valuable points in the pole vault where they managed only a fifth place tie this year.

The spotlight on the Aggie trackmen this weekend will be at Philadelphia where they will enter the 440 and mile relays plus two individual performers.

The Aggies' 440 relay unit of Scotty Hendricks, Marvin Mills, Curtis Mills and Rockie Woods will be out to better its best time

The Aggie mile relay will have a new look as freshman Willie Blackmon will run for the first time in over a month on the relay. Blackmon, who ran a 46.2 leg when the Aggies set a world indoor mark this February at the Astrodome in the mile relay, has been out with a muscle pull. He ran a 47.4 quarter in the Drake Relays on the Aggies' sprint medley relay.

AUSTIN (AP)—James Street of Longview, fiercely competitive Texas Longhorn pitcher, has been named the most valuable player for the third straight year.

Street, a senior righthander, hurled a perfect no-hit, no-run game during the past season and won eight games while losing only one.

He was a second-team All-America in 1968 and 1969 and also was selected the most valuable player on the national champion football team this past season.

As a quarterback he directed the Longhorns to 20 straight victories.

Other most valuable player awards at the spring sports banquet went to Wayne Doyal of San Antonio in basketball, George Machock of Austin in golf, Bruce Robinson of Clearwater in swimming, John Mozola of Houston in tennis and Fred Cooper of Stinet in track.

## Baseballers reject proposed three-year contract, 505-89

NEW YORK — By an overwhelming vote of 505-89, major league baseball players have rejected a proposed three-year contract and asked for a new meeting with the big league club-owners.

All of the 24 major league teams, except the Philadelphia Phillies, voted against the offer which had been submitted to the players for secret ballots without any recommendation from Marvin Miller, executive director of the Major League Baseball Players Association.

Miller revealed the vote Wednesday when he said the Associa-

tion has asked for a meeting with the owners' representatives to determine if the outstanding differences can be resolved.

John Gaherin, who represents the owners in these negotiations, said he expected his group would meet with Miller's organization, "before the end of the week."

The major leagues have scheduled a joint meeting Friday to discuss the contract and "several matters of general interest."

Although some player representatives have talked of a one-day baseball moratorium on a Saturday when the Game of the Week is televised nationally, there was no threat of any such action in Miller's statement.

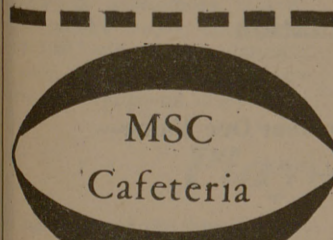

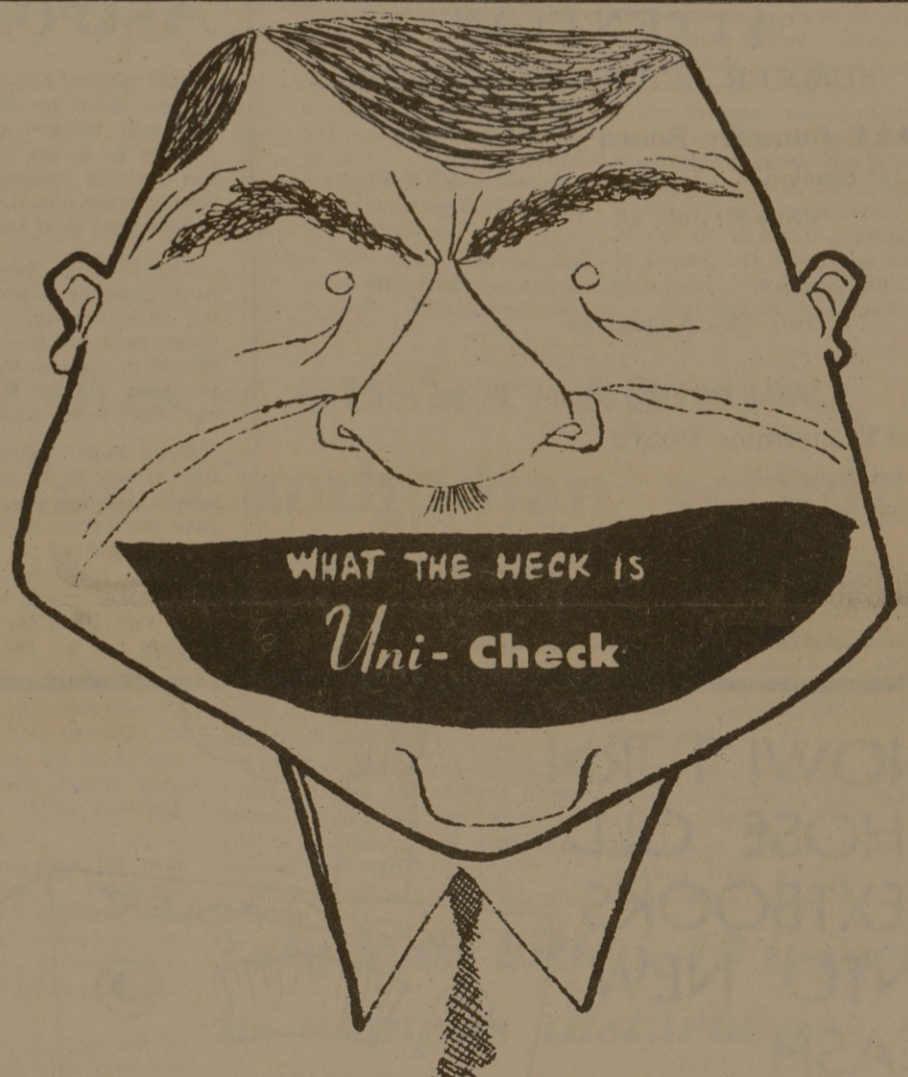
