Dr. Clark, 38, joined the faculty in 1967, the year he received a Ph.D. in education from Ohio State.




Applications of remote sensing techniques to the petroleum industry will be explained during a one - day university - sponsored workshop Oct. 12 in Houston.

The program is a pilot project by Texas A&M to determine the need for further expanding the university's remote sensing services to the petroleum industry.


