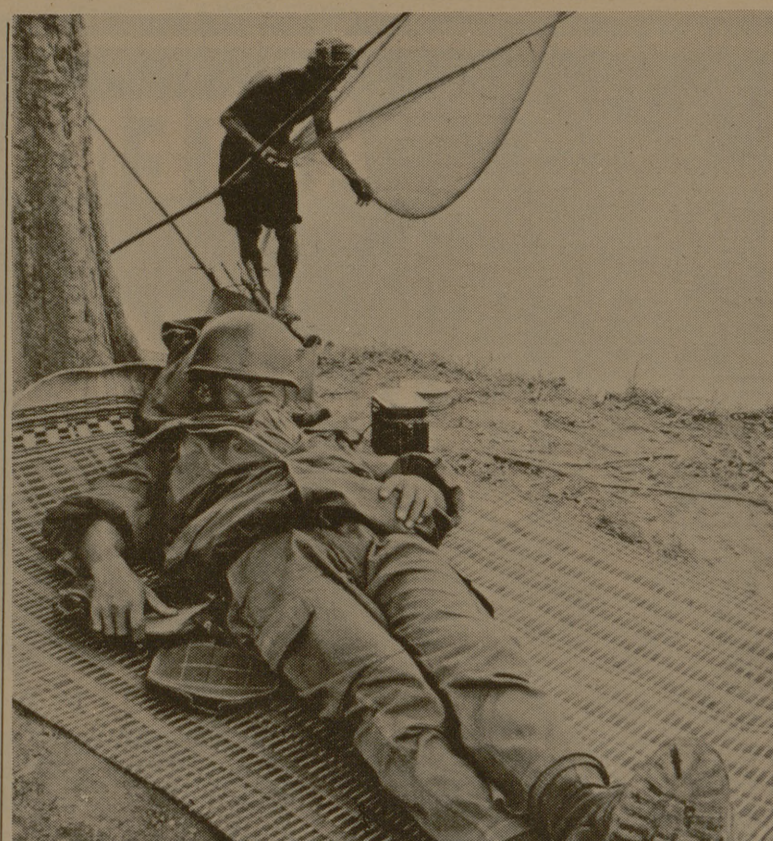

Five Middle East hijackings result in over 300 hostages

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS The number of Middle East hijack attacks this week grew to five Wednesday when Arab commandos seized a British Overseas Airways Corp. plane near the Persian Gulf.

The BOAC VC10 joined two other captive planes on a guerrilla-held Jordan desert airstrip and its 113 passengers and crewmen raised the number of hostages to more than 300.

The pro-Marxist Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine, which assumed responsibility for the rash of hijackings, had threatened to blow up the first two planes, a Swissair DC8 and a Trans World Airlines Boeing 707.

The latest PFLP seizure fueled tension at airports around the world. It also appeared to widen the breach between the pro-Peking group and major Arab capitals.

At the behest of Britain and the United States, the U.N. Security Council convened in New York to consider the crisis posed by the hijackings.

In Washington, the White House announced that six large Air Force transports were being dispatched to Turkey with medical evacuation teams in case they should be needed in Jordan.

A spokesman declined to say if any U.S. military units or equipment would be moved nearer

the guerrilla base where the hostages and planes were held.

The British jetliner was seized just after its take off from Bahrain on the Persian Gulf during a flight from Bombay to London.

A BOAC spokesman said 30 women and 21 children, en route to schools in England, were among the 103 passengers. At least three Americans and members of Bahrain's royal family were also said to be aboard the plane which carried 10 crew members.

In Beirut, where the BOAC refused before continuing to the guerrilla-held airstrip in northern Jordan, a PFLP spokesman said the plane was hijacked to reinforce a demand that Britain free Leila Khaled, 25, being held in London for Sunday's abortive attempt to seize an Israeli El Al airliner.

The guerrillas also were demanding the release of three Arab commandos in West Germany and three others in Switzerland, all jailed for involvement in other hijacking incidents.

All three governments were reported willing to comply with the demand, but only on the condition that all hostages - including a number of Israeli citizens - were released.

There were signs that Arab governments, despite support for Palestinian efforts to recover former homes in what is now Israel, were getting fed up with the PFLP's air piracy activities.

At Cairo airport, where a Pan American World Airways jumbo 747 was blown up after being diverted there by PFLP hijackers Sunday, officials closed the airstrip to prevent the hijacked BOAC from landing there.

Amman's airport also was closed, and Beirut, although it allowed the plane to be refueled at its facility, indicated no other hijacked aircraft would be allowed to do so. Transport Minister Pierre Gemayel said Lebanon intended "to maintain Beirut airport as a civil airport in every sense of the word."

Gemayel became angry after he appealed to the guerrillas to let women and children go. The hijackers replied: "No, we are leaving with everybody as we are blowing up the plane with everybody."

Officials then allowed the BOAC to depart. After circling around the Middle East for hours, it finally landed at the airstrip 25 miles northeast of Amman where the two other planes had been held since Sunday.

Although PFLP spokesmen gave discrepant figures on the number of hostages, Trans World Airlines said in Amman on Wednesday that 197 persons - 110 on the Boeing and 87 on the DC-10 - were still aboard the aircraft.

Armed commandos continued to guard the three planes, without air conditioning. Temperatures in the desert area ranged from about 86 degrees during the day to 68 degrees at night.

75 garden club members here for 3-day school

Approximately 75 garden club members from throughout Texas and at least three other states will attend a three-day landscape design school today through Friday at A&M.

The course is designed to train community leaders in the appreciation of good landscape design and to help them create a pleasant community environment, noted A&M Landscape Architect Robert H. Rucker.

Registration began at 8 a.m. Wednesday in the Memorial Student Center Social Room. Tuition is \$14 and includes a study manual and examination Friday morning.

Advanced registrations from Texas, Kansas, New Mexico and Arkansas have been received, Rucker said.

Sponsored by Texas Garden Clubs, Inc., the program is part of a national continuing education program by the National Council of State Garden Clubs, Inc., of St. Louis, Mo.

A&M's school, "Landscape Design Course 2," is one of 18 conducted this year in the United States, Rucker explained. Last year 50 men and women completed the Course 1 study at A&M.

Rucker, national chairman of the landscape design study course, is one of two men on the 150-member national board. He is coordinating the school and will be one of five instructors.

Other instructors are Dr. Clare A. Gunn, Wendell G. Horsley, Everett E. Janne and Robert F. White.

Dr. Gunn is a licensed landscape architect and Ph.D. graduate of the University of Michigan. His experience ranges from illustration engineer and research associate in tourist and resort buildings to extension specialist in tourism recreation development and land and water conservation.

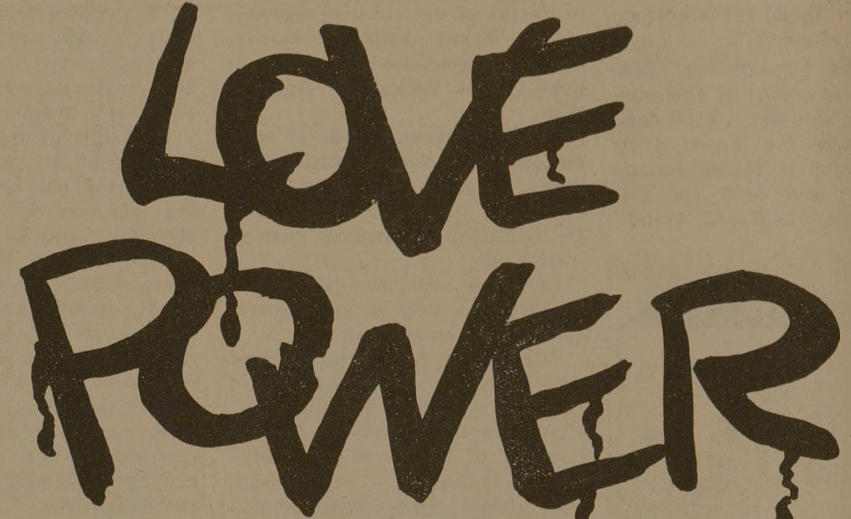
He is professor of tourism recreation development at Texas A&M. Horsley has degrees in advertising design and art history from the University of Denver. He has taught art, advertising design and art history at the University of Illinois and Southwestern Louisiana.

Currently associate professor of architectural design at A&M, Horsley has experience in production art for retail advertising publications design, art direction and visual specialist for Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Janne is ornamental plants and landscaped area specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. He will teach site design and ground form.

White, head of A&M's Landscape Architecture Department, will teach development of landscape architecture from 1840-1950 and the professional landscape architect.

Rucker will teach elements of landscape architectural design and execution of landscape architectural design.
